"Masterpieces in Motion: How Art and Community Transform Lives"



Every great masterpiece begins with a blank canvas—and at We Care Arts, they see that same potential in the individuals they serve. On April 14th, Executive Director Katie Neubert will share how the organization empowers healing through art and community by providing opportunities for people with developmental disabilities, substance use disorders, and mental health diagnoses to connect, create, and thrive.

Through free on-site and virtual classes, employment training, high school Transition to Work programs, and outreach services, We Care Arts impacted 3,086 individuals in 2024 across six counties in the Greater Miami Valley. Their programs help participants build skills, grow in confidence, and experience the joy of creative expression within a welcoming and inclusive community.

Still, there is more work to be done. We Care Arts is continuing to rebuild from the effects of COVID-19, a time when the organization was reduced to just four employees and no artist-clients on-site. While tremendous progress has been made, the need remains great—and each open seat in their classrooms represents an opportunity waiting to be filled.

Katie looks forward to sharing how, together, we can help paint a brighter, more connected future—one brushstroke at a time.

This Happened Last Monday...

The Rotary Club of Dayton gathered on Monday, April 7, 2025, at Sinclair Community College for its annual Red Ribbon Takeover Meeting — a spring tradition where the club's newest members step into officer roles and host a fundraiser in support of a local nonprofit. This year's Red Ribbon cohort chose The Foodbank as their beneficiary, spotlighting the organization's critical role in our region's food security network.

Stepping in as Acting President for the day was Red Ribbon President Phil Raynes, who called the meeting to order. Emily Broughton led the club in the Pledge of Allegiance and offered "Words to Live By," before introducing Kathy Harper as Secretary of the Day.

Kathy started by recognizing birthdays and sharing upcoming events before welcoming our guests. Several members brought guests to the meeting, extending Rotary's welcome and spirit of service to the broader community. Thank you to Kathleen Carlson, Nicole Sturk, and Lisa Wagner for inviting guests and helping to share our mission.

As a nod to the weekend's torrential weather, Kathy joked that we were all probably tired of water facts, so she turned to food facts for the day. Did you know that apples harvested this year won't hit store shelves until next year? That the Foodbank can turn every \$1 donated into four meals? And that over 100,000 people in our region experience food insecurity at any given time?

Chair of the Day Andy Clements then welcomed our featured speakers, Lee Lauren Truesdale and Kate McEwen from The Foodbank, who presented on the theme: "Feeding the Line Today, Shortening the Line Tomorrow."

They began by defining food insecurity: "the disruption of food intake or eating patterns because of lack of money or other resources."

To humanize this statistic, they shared a moving video of "Tim's Story" — a former aerospace engineer who became reliant on The Foodbank after a life-altering accident. His story served as a powerful reminder that food insecurity doesn't discriminate and that the stereotypes surrounding hunger are often wildly inaccurate. The presenters went on to share impressive operational data: over 18 million pounds of food distributed in Montgomery, Greene, and Preble counties, serving 119 food pantries, soup kitchens, and shelters. They noted that 94 cents of every dollar donated goes directly into programming — which makes funding for infrastructure, like operational technology, harder to come by and yet so core to continuing and improving this level of efficiency.

This is where our Red Ribbon fundraiser stepped in. The Foodbank's need: 12–16 handheld inventory scanners, each costing \$2,510, including cold-storage-compatible battery packs. These devices would dramatically improve their food tracking systems, minimize spoilage and increase efficiency in distribution.

After an engaging presentation followed by a strong question & answer period, Kathy Harper kicked off the "Day 10s" fundraising round. Hands flew up around the room — and by the end of the meeting, \$8,100 was raised toward the \$8,000-\$10,000 goal. The good news is that we reached our goal. The EVEN BETTER news is that it's not too late to contribute — donations can still be made online via the QR code shared in the meeting and this week's newsletter.

Next, Ginger Clark brought the energy to Blanton's Bourbon Raffle, announcing **April Hale** as the lucky winner! The meeting concluded with the Four-Way Test, led by Terra Williams, before Acting President Phil Raynes officially adjourned the meeting.

We look forward to seeing everyone next Monday, April 14, at Sinclair Community College or on Zoom. Our speaker will be **Katie Neubert**, **Executive Director at We Care Arts** — and no, before you ask, the Foodbank does NOT provide rotten fruits and vegetables to throw at next week's speaker!!




