

President Randy then introduced Diane Welborn, on behalf of our foundation, presented a \$3,000 check to Rachel Zidaroff of United Rehabilitation Services for their Get Set Initiative for Children. Working with ages 3-5 getting them ready for Kindergarten

Next up was a bowling trophy presentation - A end of the season bowling competition between Dayton and Cincinnati Rotary a tradition since 1966. The trophy is named after Cincinnati Rotarian Norris Kindell/and



Dayton Rotarian Dick Hauser Trophy. The trophy was presented by Gary Kindell to Mollie Hauser to accept on behalf of the Dayton Club.

Bill Nance interviewed Steve Conklin for a member spotlight who started being involved with the YMCA as a coach and then served on the board at the South YMCA and then got involved in the Greater Dayton YMCA. Steve enjoys camping, canoeing and cycling and he likes to be outdoors.

Karla Garrett Harshaw served as chair of the day and introduced our speakers, Gerri Pegues and Jessica Jenkins to speak about the Montgomery County Human Services Levy.

Gerri started with her connection to Dayton Rotary. She participated in a Rotary Group Study Exchange to Malaysia in 2008 led by former Dayton Rotarian Hans Berkel. She said that this experience has played a significant role in her life.

Montgomery County Mission - we create value by investing in people, the economy, and services for all to lead safe, healthy, and productive lives. She reviewed the background of the Human Services Levy back in the late 70's early 80's they took 6 separate issues into 2 and combined them into a levy system that comes up around every 3-4 years. The County Commissioners appoint the Human Services Levy Council which is made up of community leaders. Gerri reviewed the Human Services Levy Organization Chart and what services are included.

Jessica Jenkins then shared The Why and the Impact:

ADAMHS - in 2023 2,937 children and adults received individual services and an additional 13,000 are touched by the system. JFS - Children Services Division - 8,590 children in 4,574 families received services in 2023. Developmental Disabilities Services - 3,741 people served in 2023 and a total of 5,669 people impacted. Public Health Dayton & Montgomery County - 78,885 individual encounter services were delivered in 2023.

A map of the county was shared to show those who are touched by these human services. A chart of how the 2025 Human Service Levy allocations would be invested for homelessness services, older adult services, complex medical/mandated share, supported services and general community programs.

Our local resources leverage state and federal resources for a total of almost \$349.5M in total resources.

Current environment: still feeling effects of pandemic - impacts shared by the agencies are an increase in community needs, additional statemandated costs and service requirements and increased cost of services.

Voters have been surveyed about what they think about Human Services in Montgomery County.

Levy B will be up for renewal in 2025. Even though there are more needs, the voters said things are tough and they can't support an increase.


