The Dayton region faces a growing challenge: more job openings than people to fill them. This isn't just a labor shortage—it's a systems issue. President's Time

President Randy introduced Bill Nance to facilitate a Peace Builder interview with Gary Leppla, a local attorney. He discussed the NAACP Environmental Justice Committee that works in the area of civil rights, environment, clean energy and disaster infrastructure preparedness. Chair of the Day

Karla Garrett Harshaw, Chair of the Day introduced our speaker Ryan Ernst, The Connor Group and Director of the nonprofit, Kids and Community Partners that operates the Greater Dayton School. Ryan has a background as a sportswriter. He is a graduate of Ohio University and received a master's from the University of Dayton. Ryan shared many ways in which the Greater Dayton School is being innovative in their approach to education.

- · Students have an individual education experience
- Mental Health support occurs naturally as part of the program, just like fluoride is in the water and one doesn't really know Physical Health- 67 minutes of fitness include 30 minutes of physical activity each day
 - Kids are trusted and treated like college students- as they can work independently, they are trusted to work outside the classroom in more and more independent ways- these can be taken back and then earned back.
 - Students have jobs and earn money that can be used to purchase items in their school store, teaching financial knowledge and management.
 - Students lead parent-teacher conferences and the group provides ideas on how they will support the students' learning plan. Family-style meals and culturally diverse foods
- They have identified the 8 traits that make teachers successfully teach low-income students and recruit from around the country.
- Parent involvement and commitments

He noted that at The Conner Group they have a saying that professionals built the Titantic and amateurs built the Ark. This led them to spend several years learning about education systems around the world and develop the approach at the Greater Dayton School. The overall goal is that at Age 27 the alumni will be financially stable, employed, living lives of integrity and their own definition of success.

Several questions were asked, including funding and parent commitment. Ryan noted the school receives the Ed Choice voucher, which is about \$6,200/student, and he estimates the cost between 25k- 32k. They are looking at launching a school in the Cincinnati area and the donor support to make this work.
