President Shaun Yu shared Reflections of the year:

- o When started Presidency, Rotary had only resumed in person for 3 weeks
- o Introduced new fee structure for solvency
- o Club still boasts 219 active members, more women than ever before
  - 64 of 219 members, have been in club 3 years or less
- o we joined in a district project with Sleep in Heavenly Peace, helping to build beds, donate sheet sets and blankets, so no child has to sleep on the floor
- o Participated in planting trees after tornados through Retreat
- o Manned a Tour de Gem pit stop
- o Gardened and installed smoke detectors in Edgemont
- o Red Ribbon class raised \$25K for a canine for Dayton police department
- o Carolyn Rice and Kelly Lehman spearheaded a curriculum teaching high schoolers about peace
- o A Club assembly was held for the first time in many years giving officers and directors insight into Club operations
- o Tighted relationships with other clubs
  - Springboro and Cincinnati
- o Club members have been the featured speakers and have presented at 10 of the 45 meetings
- o The divisions in our country all disappear when we work together to sand wood for a bedframe for a child and turning dirt in a garden
- o Two requests:
  - Everyone Bring One - bring a prospective member to Rotary, as membership is critical to our future
  - Support Rotary International, one of the finest charitable organizations according to Charitable International
    - 62 members made a gift to Rotary International
    - Per capita for our club, is \$95/per person, a 5 year high
    - In 2018-2019 pre covid, per capita was \$80
- o Shaun made the following acknowledgements:

  - Station staff and Board-Incredibly patient with support
  - Executive director Laura-New boss every year, without complaint
  - President Elect Walt Hibner

  - Linda-Great secretary, but he remembers her mostly for the saw dust and red paint during service projects this year
  - Matt Scarr-Treasurer and great financial acumen driven by a wish to do good

  - Lisa Grigsby- for stepping up to the membership recruitment position
  - Becky Benna -Community outreach, sending two groups to Camp Kern
  - Lisa Wagner-Education committee, and persevering during COVID

  - John Lyman-For his work in programs and friendship
  - Iris Juergens who put her heart and soul into red ribbon and is next year's social chair



Dr. Mary Ramey walked us through the Bosnian Display, a must-see while you are there.




Our next book continues the theme, *The Bosnia List: A Memoir of War, Exile & Return* by Kenan Trebinčević, Susan Shapiro, et al.
