"Maintaining America's Advantage at Sea"



Rear Admiral John Spencer is the Commander of Submarine Group Ten. He will be speaking to us about Maintaining America's Advantage at Sea. Preserving America's strategic interests overseas is an important part of our Navy's mission. But America's Navy also plays a large part in preserving trade around the world. More than 41 million U.S. jobs – 26 percent – are directly or indirectly tied to global trade. Twenty-six percent of U.S. manufacturing jobs depend on exports. The free flow of goods over the world's oceans is a national security issue. And the Navy, operating forward, ensures this flow of goods remains unimpeded. Something most Americans don't think about, but more than 95 percent of all international phone and internet traffic is transmitted via undersea communication cables. America's Navy plays a critical role in also protecting these vital electronic conduits.

Things Still Go Bump

in the Night

Sharlet, in recognizing Dayton as the Seat of Innovation, considers herself the second female president of the hospital, recognizing the importance of Virginia Kettering. She highlighted three areas of innovation at Kettering: Neurosurgery related to Parkinson's and Deep Brain Stimulation where she showed a patient's hand movement with and without stimulation. Spinal Deformities where she showed x-rays of before and after surgery demonstrating the power of PET. She said spinal surgery is as delicate as handling an egg.

Molecular Imaging and Nuclear Medicine – a precision technology where the future lies in both diagnosis and therapeutics, i.e., precision medicine. The technology uses both the Cyclotron and a pharmaceutical agent at the hospital. Because the cyclotron can't be moved, Kettering needs to partner with pharmaceutical companies around the country to bring in more agents. Kettering is the only hospital in the country as a model, which in 3-5 years could be a template to provide for tens of thousands of patients a year and not just hundreds. Sharlet said that Virginia Kettering in 1989 had donated \$5 M for the first Cyclotron at Kettering. Precision medicine is an exciting future.

Walt concluded with the ticket drawing. Kevin Mulder won the four Air Show tickets. The Queen of Arts drawing was the nine of diamonds. Walt encouraged members to bring guests who may want to become members. He spoke of next week being Navy Week in memory of Jim Gallagher and our speaker. The Nancy Blue Angels will perform at the Dayton Air Show. The meeting adjourned.



Dr. Mary Ramey walked us through the Bosnian Display, a must-see while you are there.




Our next book continues the theme, *The Bosnia List: A Memoir of War, Exile & Return* by Kenan Trebinčević, Susan Shapiro, et al.
