President Walt then can back to the podium and called Bill Nance to interview Frank Gilland from Irongate Realty for our monthly vocational spotlight. Frank Gilland joined the Dayton Rotary in 1981 and has been with Irongate Realty for 31 years! A winning combination! He served as President of the Downtown Dayton Association; worked at channel 16; and 3rd National Bank. All that experience gives us confidence in his views of the Dayton and surrounding area real estate climate. Bill: Considering the current buying and selling climate in our areas, how do you think Dayton is faring?

Frank: It is interesting! The numbers that we often hear are mostly national figures and take into consideration all the markets from the east to the west side of our nation. That is not really a good view of our area. It is true that Dayton is down because of low inventory.

Bill: What is the hot spot for the Dayton region?

Frank: From central Dayton to the south, Oakwood is doing well, and then Bellbrook and Springboro. To the North --Englewood and Huber Heights. And of course Beavercreek. For Dayton Proper, meaning in the city, it is Growing! That is exciting because as people move into the downtown area, it opens up the economy by making demands for new businesses, which makes improvement in all areas of the city!

Bill: Interest rates are up and climbing. What do you say to them?

Frank: If you want to buy a house, Buy it! It is always good to buy and the rates are not really that high.

President Wakt then called on Dean Alexander to introduce our speaker for the Day, Angela Stewart from Dayton Aviation Heritage, NHP. She is the Park's coordinator for the Dunbar 150 Celebrations, Dayton's year-long commemoration of the sesquicentennial of Paul Laurence Dunbar's birth. Angela is from Denver, Colorado, and a graduate of Tuskegee university, which Mr. Dunbar helped to found. She has worked for the Tuskegee-Macon County Development Corp, the Tuskegee University Extension; AmeriCorp; United Way; and after moving to the Dayton area, she worked with Preschool Promise and the Northwest Dayton Partnership before becoming a Park Ranger. She and her husband, Robert are a dual-career National Park Service couple! The National Park service has been connecting with the community with different events in celebration of Paul Laurence Dunbard. Paul Laurence Dunbar was born here in Dayton in 1872 - 150 years ago. He was the first child of Matilda Burton Murphy Dunbar and Joshua Dunbar both from Kentucky and they were born enslaved. Matilda moved to Dayton after emancipation because her mother and grandmother and sister lived here in Dayton on Howard Street. Matilda was pregnant from a previous marriage when she moved here. Matilda learned how to read after moving to Dayton and she went on to encourage Paul Laurence to be educated. Promise was seen in him at a very young boy making rhymes. Paul Laurence attended Central High School downtown alongside of Orville Wright. At 18 years old, Paul Laurence Dunbar started a newspaper for the African American community called the Tattler. The newspaper was printed on a press owned by the Wright Brothers. Paul Laurence Dunbar was the only African American in his class. He was great at recitation and writing and helped many fellow students. He was known for his poetry but he also wrote books and short stories. He was known for his dialect poetry. As an African American during that time period he was not considered an equal but he was able to move in circles of people of many different races. After graduation, he aspired to a career in law but because of his financial situation, it didn't allow him to attend university. He sought employment with various Dayton businesses, including newspapers, but was rejected because of his race. He settled for work as an elevator operator at the Callahan building and this allowed him time to continue his writing. The Paul Laurence Dunbar Home Historical Site is run by the National Parks and it was the first State Memorial Named for an African American in the United States. The flagship celebration was held at the Victoria Theatre which is formally the Dayton Opera House where Paul Laurence Dunbar's high school class graduated. Angela encouraged the group to watch the Video 20 & Odd. The narrative for "Twenty & Odd" is Maya Angelou's remarkable piece, "Still I Rise." Through its voice and imagery, the film advances messages of African American empowerment, remembrance, education, inspiration, and engagement in iconic places stewarded by the National Park Service.


