The district currently has 400 school-aged students who are homeless, living in shelters. And, 575 children under the age of 5 are displaced as well. The need is great so members are encouraged to give funds to provide coats and other needed items.

- Iris Juergens gave a Day 100 toward her Paul Harris Fellowship for "her" Houston Astros and the terrific event at the DAI.
- Joanna McCord gave a Day 250 to the Coats Plus project, thanks to the support of her business, Union Savings Bank.
- Michelle Feltz donated a Day 35 and was thankful for being a female Goodwill employee.
- Sarah Hippensteel Hall recognized Becky Benna for receiving the lifetime achievement award from Ohio Parks and Rec.

Walt returned to the podium to begin the Club Assembly portion of the meeting and explained that this program would be different from previous Club Assemblies...he didn't want to be the one talking the entire time. The purpose of a Club Assembly is to share information, identify issues and discuss future plans. Walt talked about Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) and encouraged others to participate in this worthwhile program in the future. He talked about the past few years and how COVID disrupted many things, including our Dayton Rotary Club. He shared current club demographics and acknowledged that our membership numbers have declined since 2019, but we are now beginning to see more new members join our club. In the Spring, Walt will lead a strategic planning process with the board and will incorporate round table discussions into the next club assembly.

In summary, we will develop a roadmap for the club to help ALL Rotarians find their interests and avenues of service.

Treasurer Matt Scarr then came to the podium and shared a very brief report about the club's finances. Our delinquent dues list is the lowest its ever been (YAY!) and while we anticipate a close to break even year (2022-23) our net income and finances overall are trending in the right direction.

Next, Frank Scott, Holly Wiggins and Lisa Grigsby provided a Dayton Rotary Foundation update and shared that having our own foundation is a true blessing for this community. Last year, Dayton Rotarians gave \$32,000 in unrestricted funds to the foundation (via DayTens, other gifts) and allowed us to provide \$3,000 grants to local non-profit organizations. The Dayton Foundation manages our foundation funds and we currently have \$850,000 in assets. We are allowed to grant or use 4% of those funds annually. The foundation board meets four times per year to carefully consider grant requests and so far this year the Dayton Rotary Foundation has supported Agape for Youth, Prevent Blindness Ohio, Femme Aid, Story Chain and Graceworks Lutheran Services.

There are three fellowship opportunities for our own foundation – Woodhull (local projects), Anderson (international projects) and Lasley (education projects). The District (6670) provides matching grant dollars for many projects as well. For Rotary International, there are many opportunities to give and a Paul Harris Fellowship is the most common avenue for members to support the RI foundation.

Kelly Lehman then came to the podium to recognize and celebrate the women of Dayton Rotary. The next presenters were Fred Abrams and Diane Welborn, along with special guest Hope Taft. They shared some background and history about previous Dayton Rotary international projects (Kenya and Nigeria) and emphasized that all, including the current project in Ecuador, focus on providing clean water to areas that have none.

The current project in Ecuador grew out of discussions with the Tandana Foundation of Dayton in partnership with the Quito Ecuador club back in 2019. The San Juan de Inguincho village had both water quantity and quality issues and the people of the village provided most of the labor to install the new system. RI funds are not available to provide the \$7,300 needed to repair the damage, but the district has committed up to \$3,650 if Dayton Rotary can raise the other half.

All donations are welcome and various parts of the project can be adopted by businesses, individuals, other entities. Hope Taft thanked the club for their dedication thus far and asked for continued support from our members to fix the water system in this village. A video was shown and comments provided by the guests from Ecuador.

To close out the very informative meeting, Walt thanked all the presenters and guests for their time and dedication to Rotary.
