Rotarians Unite For Good To End Polio

Coming up in October, Rotary clubs throughout District 6690 are planning events to raise funds to end polio and increase awareness of why this world-wide effort to vaccinate children is so critical.

This year, Newark Rotary Club is organizing a multi-club polio event led by Rotarian Heather Powell on Oct. 21 from 4:30 to 7:30 p.m. at Mariposa In downtown Newark. Many other clubs have plans underway for World Polio Day on Oct. 24.



Today, polio cases still exist in Afghanistan and Pakistan. Last April, Afghanistan began two nationwide campaigns and synchronized the campaigns with Pakistan to close the immunity gaps in their countries. These campaigns were in response to the resurgence of wild poliovirus in 2024 paralyzing 99 children across both countries.


Since launching its PolioPlus program 40 years ago, Rotary has contributed more than \$2.7 billion to fight polio and countless volunteer hours. Rotary partnered in 1988 with the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to form the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. The Gates Foundation and Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, joined later. When the initiative began, there were 350,000 cases of polio every year.

Rotary has committed to raising \$50 million each year to support the global polio eradication efforts. The Gates Foundation will match these funds 2-to-1 for a total yearly contribution of \$150 million.

Our first district-wide service project of the year starts on October 1st! We call it "Sock-tober" and we hope that every club in the district will participate in a sock collection to help people in your area experiencing homelessness. Socks are the most requested item of clothing for those people living on the streets or in homeless shelters, since they can't do laundry and they wear out quickly when worn constantly.

Last year, the Circleville club was our grand prize winner with 2,886 pairs of socks collected and the Logan club was the top collector per capita, with almost 41 pairs of socks collected per club member! As a district, we collected over 20,000 pairs of socks that were donated to the homeless shelters of your choice. I hope we can surpass that this year!
