PROGRAM

Fellow Rotarian, **Brad Schumaker**, introduced our speaker, **Steve Layman**, who provided an update on Licking County's ongoing development and expansion. Nearly 19 months ago, Layman addressed Rotary about key infrastructure and economic projects—many of which have since seen major progress. His presentation highlighted the county's rapid growth, infrastructure improvements, and economic investments shaping the region's future.

Transportation projects remain a priority, with Newark's only two-lane roundabout now complete and the bridges over State Route 16 expected to be finished by summer. The temporary bridge that helped with traffic congestion may be repurposed elsewhere. Meanwhile, the historic Arcade renovation is largely complete, featuring a revitalized community space and a popular Friday farmers market. Additional city beautification efforts have addressed small but noticeable details, such as improving the appearance of utility transformers. A long-planned 400-space parking garage is well underway and set to open later this summer, easing parking concerns downtown.

Commercial development is accelerating. PCA is constructing a major facility on Thornwood Avenue, with a new roundabout planned at Thornwood and Fave. Several retail spaces are being repurposed—21st Street's former Kroger is becoming a Goodwill, the Big Lots building will house the nonprofit Furniture Bank, and the former Family Video at West Main and Church is now a Red Cross donation center. A QuickLube is also set to open on 21st Street.

Microsoft is making significant investments, acquiring 200 acres for a planned 1.25-million-square-foot facility. The company has committed \$13-\$17 million toward Heath's infrastructure, including sewer line expansions. Additional land acquisitions in Hebron signal continued economic investment. Meanwhile, housing developments are keeping pace with demand—315 new single-family homes are planned in Hebron, and MI Homes is developing land annexed from Granville into Heath.

Future plans include turning the Van Boris farm into Heath's downtown district. though regulatory challenges remain. Discussions are also ongoing about extending the Heath airport runway. The Intel project remains a wild card, with completion estimated around 2028. However, Layman believes development will progress faster than projected. While Intel's delay has given local leaders time to plan strategically, it has also helped prevent Licking County from experiencing rapid, unchecked growth. With careful planning and continued investment, the county remains well-positioned for sustainable expansion in the years ahead.
