PROGRAM

Fellow Rotarian, **Melissa Owens** introduced today's guest, Jordan Davis, Executive Director of Smart Columbus, the Columbus Region's collaborative innovation lab, which focuses on advancing what is new and next at the intersection of technology and community good. Ms. Davis is a Westerville native where her father was a Rotary member.

Smart Columbus was founded in 2016 as the sole winner of the U.S. Department of Transportation's Smart City Challenge, which awarded \$50 million in grants. Columbus beat out 76 other cities for the award. Smart Columbus is an entity of the Columbus Partnership with the vision to make central Ohio the most prosperous region in the United States. Smart Columbus is focused on improving quality of life and using innovation to do so. They are thinking about the future and how technology shifts will define communities in the coming years. Some examples include autonomous vehicles, electric vehicles, and AI.

Ms. Davis also discussed how Smart Columbus is focused on understanding community problems. They test and deploy solutions that use technology to solve those problems and improve our communities.

The focus of Ms. Davis's talk today was the importance of digital access, which Smart Columbus believes is essential to achieving the vision of regional prosperity. This starts with ensuring everyone has digital access. Currently 10% of Central Ohio households are left behind digitally, with no internet access.

The research performed by Smart Columbus indicates that the primary barriers to technology adoption are: (1) availability; (2) affordability; (3) skills gap; (4) tools/device gap; (5) trust and safety; and (6) desire/willingness.

39% of Licking Co. residents would benefit from more affordable broadband. Licking County was in the top 3 counties for adoption of Affordable Connectivity Program in Central Region (45%). Ohio will receive \$800 million for broadband expansion so it's essential that we advocate for our share of these funds to help expand digital access to our many underserved areas.

Ms. Davis also mentioned that in addition to the technology access gap, there is a growing skills gap. By 2030, 75% of jobs will require advanced technology skills. Therefore, Smart Columbus's Digital Skills Hub is a Franklin County program that is working on solving the "device" problem by giving people a technology device (e.g., laptop computer) after completing a digital skills training program.

Ms. Davis then took several questions from the audience.
