PROGRAM

Rotarian Chan Cochran introduced J.P. Nauseef, President and CEO of JobsOhio, Ohio's private economic development corporation. J.P. has led JobsOhio's efforts to attract new businesses, support innovation, and drive job creation across the state. Under his leadership, JobsOhio maintains a private, stable funding model with \$1.77 billion in revenue and focuses on investment tools such as talent and workforce development, site readiness programs, growth capital initiatives, innovation districts, scaled marketing and branding, and small business and finance partnerships. He oversees an organization deeply invested in strengthening Ohio's strategic industry sectors, including advanced manufacturing, energy and chemicals, logistics, health and biosciences, technology, automotive, aerospace, financial services, and food and agriculture processing.

Mr. Nauseef began his presentation by highlighting JobsOhio's transformation of the state's economic landscape. In 2011, Ohio ranked near the bottom nationally in business growth, job creation, and economic performance. Fast forward to today, and the state now ranks among the top nationally for global groundwork, mega-project investments, and reshoring of manufacturing jobs. JobsOhio has led the way in achieving #1 rankings for new jobs created, payroll generated, capital investment, customer service excellence, and total projects delivered. Landmark projects with companies such as Intel, Honda, Anduril, and Joby Aviation have created thousands of high-quality jobs, generated billions in payroll, and fueled Ohio's economic resurgence.

He emphasized JobsOhio's broad statewide impact, including over 640 projects since 2020 that have supported small businesses, strengthened vibrant communities, and prepared development–ready sites across the state. Their investments have spurred a record number of construction jobs and contributed to Ohio leading the Midwest in population in–migration, reversing long–term trends. Mr. Nauseef outlined the organization's 2030 aspiration: to make Ohio the number one state in the Midwest and one of the top five states nationally for economic opportunity and quality of life. Key pillars of this vision include advancing the innovation economy, harnessing energy as a competitive advantage, capitalizing on emerging technologies like artificial intelligence, and expanding the Silicon Heartland initiative.

Finally, Mr. Nauseef spoke to JobsOhio's unique private, nonprofit structure as a major factor in its success, allowing for speed, transparency, and strategic discretion. Backed by a stable revenue stream and a highly experienced leadership team, JobsOhio continues to position the state for sustainable growth and long-term prosperity. Their achievements are not just economic wins—they represent a stronger, more resilient future for all Ohioans.
