PROGRAM

Rotarian Pamela Watkins introduced **Judge Tom Marcelain**, whom many know as the "king of hospitality" and top-notch bartender at Rotary events.

Judge Marcelain has served the legal community in Licking County for decades, including 13 years as a Municipal Court Judge. He earned degrees from Ashland University and Temple University School of Law, and his career includes time at Reece, Pyler and Myer, as well as Nationwide Insurance Company. He is currently the Vice President of the Ohio Sentencing Commission and a member of both the Ohio State Bar Association and the Licking County Bar Association. He and his wife have three children and three grandchildren.

Judge Marcelain began this week's program by guiding members on a short walk from the DoubleTree Hotel to the Licking County Courthouse. Once inside the recently renovated West Courtroom, he shared details about the extensive renovation efforts, which took nearly nine months. Funded by county commissioners and guided by a 2015 study, the updates included everything from lighting and architecture to historical restorations. Judge Marcelain highlighted significant artwork, including allegorical ceiling paintings, stained glass portraits of U.S. presidents, and newly commissioned pieces depicting the Magna Carta and the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

He offered a rich history of the courthouse, originally built in 1876 and partially destroyed by a fire in 1879. The fire severely damaged the original wooden bell tower and courtroom interiors, erasing early artistic elements whose appearance is still unknown today. During the most recent renovations, several long-hidden ceiling paintings were uncovered, one signed by an Italian artist from New York. These paintings, along with the careful use of color and light, now enhance the courtroom's atmosphere, making it both beautiful and dignified. The project cost totaled just over \$3 million and also included refinishing the judge's office and adjacent conference room in traditional wood paneling.

In addition to its aesthetic improvements, the courtroom continues to handle the weighty responsibilities of justice, including over 1,000 felony cases per year. Judge Marcelain walked members through the trial setup, explaining where each party sits and how the courtroom functions during proceedings. He reminded attendees that despite the grandeur, this is a space where justice is served and where the community's values are reflected daily. The presentation concluded with an open invitation for members to explore the courtroom, offering a firsthand look at this restored Licking County landmark.
