## **PROGRAM**

**District Governor Gary Baker** introduced our speaker, Michael Shearer, Executive Editor of the Columbus Dispatch. A former resident of Newark and past member of this Rotary Club, Shearer also previously served as Executive Editor of the Akron Beacon–Journal and led the Newark Advocate and the Media Network of Central Ohio. He is a graduate of Ohio University and has remained closely connected to the evolving landscape of local journalism throughout his career.

Shearer offered a compelling look into the transformation of the news industry, particularly the shift from traditional print to digital platforms. Both the Dispatch and Advocate now have more digital than print subscribers—a milestone that reflects broader national trends. He discussed the challenges this shift presents, including how shrinking newsrooms and changing reader habits are forcing media organizations to rethink how they deliver credible and timely information.

He also spoke candidly about his concerns for the future of journalism, including the growing polarization of media consumption and the broader public's increasing skepticism toward the press. Still, he remains passionate about the role of journalism in a functioning democracy. Shearer highlighted recent examples of "impactful journalism" from the Dispatch that have led to changes in public policy and state law—demonstrating that strong local reporting can still make a real difference.

He closed by taking questions from the audience, touching on topics ranging from media bias to newsroom operations and the balance between investigative reporting and day-to-day news coverage. His message was clear: while journalism faces headwinds, its role in fostering transparency, accountability, and civic engagement remains as vital as ever.
