PROGRAM

Rotarian Sally Heckman introduced her husband, fellow **Rotarian Lee Heckman**, who delivered a powerful and personal presentation on D-Day and Operation Overlord. A longtime World War II historian and former educator, Lee brought both historical insight and a family connection to one of history's most pivotal events.

During his teaching years, Lee would begin his WWII unit by wearing his grandfather's uniform to class, helping students connect emotionally to the era. That same sense of connection carried through his presentation, as he described the scale, strategy, and legacy of the June 6, 1944 invasion.

Lee opened with background on the planning and scope of Operation Overlord, the largest amphibious assault in military history. On D-Day, over 156,000 Allied troops landed across five beaches along a 50-mile stretch of the Normandy coast. Within days, more than 300,000 troops were ashore, supported by 5,000 ships, 12,000 aircraft, and 19,000 paratroopers. He also highlighted key moments in the lead-up, including the Tehran Conference and Eisenhower's appointment as Supreme Allied Commander in December 1943.

Lee explained the importance of Allied deception tactics—particularly Operation Fortitude, which tricked the Germans into thinking the invasion would come at Pas de Calais. Fake radio transmissions, dummy equipment, and a fictitious army "commanded" by Patton diverted German forces from Normandy.

He walked the club through each of the five landing beaches—Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno, and Sword—with particular focus on Omaha, where American forces faced fierce resistance and heavy losses. He discussed the challenges of weather, terrain, and coordination, all of which played crucial roles in the outcome.

Lee also shared personal photos from a trip he and his family took to Normandy, including visits to Omaha Beach and the American cemetery. These images made the history even more poignant, especially given his grandfather's own wartime experience—shot down, captured, and held in a German POW camp for over two years.

The presentation concluded with a reflection on D-Day's legacy: it marked the beginning of the end of Nazi Germany and demonstrated the extraordinary courage, cooperation, and determination of the Allied forces. Through storytelling, visuals, and personal reflection, Lee delivered an engaging and meaningful tribute to one of the most consequential days in modern history.
