

I am proud to be a Rotarian, a global network of 1.4 million neighbors, friends, leaders, and problem-solvers who see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change.

As District Grant Chair in Buffalo, NY, and in the same District role in Florida, I have seen closeup Rotarians solving real problems with their passion, energy, and intelligence to take action on sustainable projects.

The Rotary Club of Buffalo, along with several other area Clubs, supported a St. Catherine's Canada, Rotarian in applying year after year for a Global grant for wells and sanitation in Haiti. The Buffalo Club participated in a Global Grant to purchase a CT scanner for a Cancer Hospital in India. A nearby Club used a District grant to purchase bicycle lights for local winery workers, so they could ride home safely after work. The Buffalo Club enabled a local literacy group to participate in Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, delivering a book each month to households with children, newborn to age five. I have participated in *Read Across America* and delivered Dictionaries to third graders, purchased through District grants. The Buffalo Club sponsored two Youth Exchange students each year and even sponsored a Peace Scholar at a local University. As a Rotarian and District Grant Chair, I love seeing the different ways Clubs address the needs of their communities.

The Rotary Foundation transforms my gifts through Global and District grants into service projects that change lives both close to home and around the world. Since it was founded more than 100 years ago, the Foundation has spent more than \$4 billion on life-changing, sustainable projects. Rotary International currently has six funds to choose from: Annual Fund – SHARE, Polio Plus Fund,

World Fund (permanent endowment), Disaster Response Fund, Pakistan Flood Response Fund, and the Ukraine Response Fund. Go to www.myrotary.org or send a donation through your Club.

2023-2024 Grants Approved By Sandra Yeater

District grants have been approved for the 2023-2024 fiscal year. Congratulations to the 25 Clubs who

Suntree Club's Global Grant Update:

Work continues on the Global Grant that RI approved for work on clean water and hygiene in Cane and Guachilipin, Honduras. To date, we've begun delivering water filters, erecting latrines and building pilars (water storage tanks) for the residents of the small mountain village of Guachilipin. In a neighborhood of Cane, the first well was recently dug and pump motor installed. The second well should be completed by the end of the year. One of our club members, Woody McDaniel, was on hand to view these activities. Another group of club members anticipates going to Honduras in January to celebrate the completion of the global grant projects... stay tuned!

One day... one focus ... ending polio. Those are the words from **www.endpolio.org** website. We Rotarians need to continue to be diligent in maintaining focus on eradicating polio around the world. To date there are only SEVEN cases, two in



Pakistan and five in Afghanistan! One way to continue to fight is to raise awareness and money so those children who have not yet been vaccinated can have those two important drops.

World Polio Day, October 24th, is a time for Rotary members, public health advocates, and all who want a world free from polio to come together, recognize our progress in the fight to end polio, and talk about the actions we need to take in order to end polio for good.

Some suggestions to help develop those videography skills.

- 1. Make a plan. What do you want to share? What is the purpose of your video? Who is the audience?
- 2. Choose a location that is relevant to your topic/purpose and one that will provide good light and minimal sound interference
- 3. Use natural light if you can. If indoors choose a bright space with windows,
- 4. Use a selfie-stick or tripod to help keep you video steady.
- 5. Shoot in landscape mode.
- 6. Keep the video short. 1-3 minutes are perfect for uploading, but too large for email.





AND...

Rotarians involved with Interact Clubs in public schools should be aware of State Rule 61-10.089, effective August 22, 2023, which requires individuals leading any extracurricular activity to have parental permission prior to commencing the event. The permission form must document details like the date(s) and time(s) of each event or activity, specific location and types of sponsors/guests at each activity or event, and method of supervision provided. Different schools may have different policies for implementing this law, but anticipate some delays in getting approval to meet.

Eco-Friendly Club:

The Eco-Friendly Rotary Club, which meets every Tuesday at 12:00 Noon EST via Zoom, has a focus on environmental issues and climate change. The club has a number of initiatives, one of which is *Treekly*, a smart phone app. The concept is to turn your daily steps into planted trees by funding reforestation projects worldwide. You simply download the app, then register on *Treekly* and sync your smart device or wearable, such as your Apple Watch or Fitbit, to complete steps challenges and earn trees in your virtual forest. You plant a tree for every 5,000 steps you walk weekly.

Treekly works closely with their trusted tree-planting partner, Eden Reforestation Projects, which plants mangrove trees in areas such as Haiti, Kenya, Mozambique, Madagascar, Indonesia, and Brazil. Mangrove trees have been continually recognized as a key player in the fight against climate change and are 3-4 times more effective at absorbing carbon than terrestrial rainforests. Mangroves have many other benefits to their surrounding ecosystems too. Their unique root systems provide sanctuary to a wide variety of fish in addition to filtering pollutants and impurities out of waterways, promoting healthy fisheries.
