### May means Youth Service—and also cake (Not cookies, but lots of cake)

In my own club, May is when we award scholarships to deserving high school seniors, recognize rockstar educators and invest in the future—not just of Rotary, but of society itself.

Watching my daughter Annie attend, I've seen firsthand the confidence and community it builds.


