Catherine and I truly enjoyed our club visits. We finished up with Churchland on December 12th. Lots of great times, some wonderful fellowship and just a greater clarity on just how much each of you do in your communities. I am humbled by your commitment to Creating Hope in the World.

Tutudesk Update:

On 20 Dec. James City County Rotary Club heard from District 7600 Treasurer Bill Mulvihill about the Tutudesk Campaign.



The Rotary Districts of Southern Africa are collaborating with the Tutudesk Campaign to bring writing desks to disadvantaged children in schools lacking proper infrastructure. The Desmond Tutu Tutudesk Campaign is personally led by Archbishop Desmond Tutu, who died in 2021, with the key mission to provision 20 million Tutudesks to African school children by 2025. chliaten by 2022. An estimated 95+ million children in sub-Saharan Africa are affected by classroom desk shortages, which has a direct, ongoing and extremely negative impact on the

development of the childâ \in ^{Ms} literacy and academic performance. A Tutudesk provides children in need with a mobile, steady and stable desk enabling an immediate, lasting and positive impact on the beneficiary childâ \in ^{Ms} literacy development and overall academic performance.

Fact: Did you know that conflict costs the US over \$300 b/year according to a 2008 survey by CPP Global? In 2023 dollars, that's over \$500 b/year.

Those weren't offered? It's no surprise that creating healthy relationships at work and at home can feel so challenging. The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster: + First, The development of acquaintance

as an opportunity for service;

+ Second, High ethical standards in

business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarianâ \in ^{IM}s occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

+ Third, The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

+ Fourth, The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

The Object of Rotary is a philosophical statement of Rotary's purpose and the responsibilities of Rotarians. The concept of vocational service is rooted in the second object, which calls on Rotarians to encourage and foster:

• Practice your profession with integrity, and inspire others to behave ethically through your words and actions.

By undertaking these activities, you bring vocational service to life. Vocational service is the essence of Rotary and serves as the foundation from which we serve our communities around the world. Elves on the Shelves: A Multi-club Grant Project

During the week of December 11th volunteers from five of the sixRotary clubs engaged in a

\$29,000 district grant project along with staff members from the Chesterfield Library. This district grant was the largest in project value in the t2022-2023 Rotary grant year. The elves were at work, but jolly, on this third workday of the project, including Assistant Governor Jan Rowley. who took the photos.

On this workday book plates were applied to printed material; Rotary volunteers were taught how to catalog the books, and shelve them. Among the





Rotary volunteers were Beverly Coleman and Willis Walter (Petersburg) Jen Hayek, Tracy Uzzell, and Goldie Weaver (Chester), Yulando Wallace (Petersburg Breakfast), Chris Wiegard (Hopewell), Cynthia Walker Mitchell and Jan Rowley (Prince George). The Rotary Elves did a great job. Cynthia and Tracy are in the festive attire. Chris Wiegard, who is the Deputy Librarian at the Appomattox Regional Library Systems noted that the activities on this day reminded him of his day job.

The grant project is entitled â€~Chesterfield Intersection: a library partnership project for detained youth.â€ The excerpts from the district grant application best describe the project. The Rotary clubs of Area 6 and Area 7 (Chester, Colonial Heights, Hopewell, Petersburg Breakfast, Petersburg and Prince George County) are partnering



with Chesterfield County Public Library (CCPL) and Chesterfield Juvenile Detention Home (CJDH) to provide literacy education to detained Youth.

The Chesterfield Juvenile Detention Home (CJDH) is a 90-bed secure, custody facility and part of Chesterfield County's Department of Juvenile Justice Services, with the purpose to provide a safe, secure and supportive environment for court-involved youth with the goal of promoting individual growth through education and empowerment.

The Chesterfield County Public Library's (CCPL) purpose is to enhance the lives of our citizens by providing tools for a lifetime of learning. Our vision is to deliver world-class library services that informs and inspires our customers and fosters a vibrant and thriving community.

This district grant partnership opportunity expands on the base education that CCPL and CJDH are providing to the detained juveniles. CCPL is nearby the detention facility. The CJDH library will have a culturally relevant collection aimed to provide program participants with opportunities for mental escape, and personal and social transformation and that are appropriate to residents' ages and levels of competency. This is feasible, because detention might be one of the only opportunities youths have the time, inclination, or motivation to read, due to the lack of everyday life distractions and access to technology.

Environmentally, this library will create a young adult space, typically known as "teen zones†in public libraries, that are designed as a space for young adults to engage in activities that support their developmental needs designed following guidelines established by library associations, such as the Young Adult Library Services Association (YALSA) and Ontario Public Library Association (OPLA) but are appropriate for a secure facility.

The library program does not function independently but operates within the larger detention environment. The overarching goals are therefore twofold:

1. To increase knowledge and ease of library use among juveniles who are residents of the CJDH.

2. To increase knowledge among family members and the support network of juveniles in how to cope with unlawful juvenile behaviors, how to support the entire family as they are going through the juvenile criminal justice system, understand the juvenile criminal justice system and how to speak to others when identifying juvenile risk behaviors that can place the community in danger.

The Rotary partnership with CJDH and CCPL will expand education literacy to the affected juveniles to improve their lives in education and literacy as they are detained at CJDH.â€

Paul Harris Recognitions:
