Speaker - PDG Rich Carson, Rotary Representative to the Organization of American States

PDG Rich is the sole Rotary representative to the Organization of American States (OAS), which encompasses 37 countries in the Western Hemisphere. He described past collaborations with OAS, including projects in Panama for refugees and literacy training in Ecuador, as well as a backpack

initiative for Venezuelan migrants. Rich noted that while he currently manages OAS relations, he could benefit from additional volunteers and has the authority to form committees to support these efforts.

He gave a brief description and history of Rotary's representative network, highlighting its 30 senior representatives at UN organizations. He described significant projects including the White House programs and participation in COP 23 (The 2017 United Nations Climate Change Conference was an international meeting of political leaders, non-state actors and activists to discuss environmental issues). PDG Rich reminded the club of Rotary's substantial involvement in the UN's founding in 1945. He also covered the OAS's role in the Western Hemisphere, including their funding of the MERCOSUR project for displaced persons in Central America, and concluded with a description of a successful vocational training school in Guatemala managed by Rotarians through AK Tenement

PDG Rich discussed a major project aimed at helping indigenous girls in Guatemala, which is tied to the Organization of American States (OAS) and involves an MOU between four Rotary districts, including District 7620. He highlighted that the Washington DC Club recently joined the initiative, and explained the core theme of creating scalable projects to help people find work and stay in their countries.

The discussion then focused on the complex nature of migration and the challenges faced by Central American countries, particularly due to civil wars, poverty, and natural disasters. It highlighted the impact of COVID-19, which exacerbated poverty and reversed progress in the region, and the role of climate change in affecting the coffee industry. The conversation also touched on funding issues, with the cancellation of a \$2 million USAID project, and explored alternative funding sources such as Lions Clubs and UNICEF.

The discussion focused on a project aimed at supporting 300 indigenous girls in Guatemala, addressing issues such as adolescent pregnancy, malnutrition, and school dropouts. The project, which has been operating for over 30 years, is seeking additional funding sources, including Lions Clubs and organizations like UNICEF and Rotary, to scale up its efforts. The team is building new districts and clubs into the network, with support from various international organizations and a strong team of volunteers.

The meeting focused on the impact of political changes and funding cuts on NGOs, particularly in Guatemala, where Rotary projects have been significantly affected. explained that the removal of \$2 million in funding could have scaled their program from 300 to a larger number of girls, but a \$140,000 Rotary grant, including \$20,000 from each district, is now being used to cover the first year of tuition for these girls. The project, which trains girls as GPS land surveyors, has seen positive developments with 150 new government-vetted teachers, though plans for an exchange trip with an Interact Club were not realized last year. The discussion also touched on UNICEF's work in Central America and potential new partnerships, including exploring connections with UNICEF and the Inter-American Development Bank.

The meeting focused on David Sherby's potential involvement in identifying funding sources at the IDB, with plans for a future dinner event in the fall to engage more partners. Rich shared updates on his ongoing involvement with OAS, highlighting the new Secretary General Albert Ramdin and plans for a formal signing ceremony in mid-July. The group also discussed Rich's physical therapy sessions and past experiences with Sandy's club, including a memorable event in the Bahamas.

PDG Sandy and PDG Rich reminisced about President George W. Bush's speaking at the Stafford Rotary club, which involved closing roads and causing traffic disruptions. Sandy expressed

gratitude for PDG Rich's recent presentation, highlighting the importance of the topic related to helping young girls in Guatemala. He mentioned being tempted to decline the speaking opportunity due to a knee injury but decided to proceed after considering PDG Renee's background with the military.

The conversation ended with updates and discussions about ongoing projects and personal matters.

- Nelda shared progress on her quilt for the raffle and requested assistance with ticket distribution, while Kristy agreed to research the legality of virtual tickets.
- Debra mentioned Abby's recent graduation and employment and reminded members to pay for spring lunches at Stafford High School.
- PDG Sandy led the group in the Four-Way Test, and the conversation ended with concerns about PDG George's health, with Sandy agreeing to follow up.
