Sixty boreholes and twelve electric pumps will be provided. 566 toilets and a toilet block of 12 toilets in a high school will be provided. Charlotte Hall Rotary Club contributed \$15,000 and 36 other clubs and 11 other districts contributed \$59,028.

Another Global Grant totaling \$89,000 was for establishing a Neonatal Intensive Care Unit in Kem Hospital Puna. Charlotte Hall Rotary contributed \$14,700 and three other districts and three other clubs contributed.

DC Rotary Foundation Awards \$200,000 in Community Grants!



We are very pleased to announce that the DC Rotary Club's and Foundation's Boards at their April meetings have adopted the recommendations of the Community Service Grants Committee and awarded a total of \$200,000 in grants to worthy non-profits serving the DMV. We were able to provide funding to 32 different

The Daily Record's Health Care Heroes Awards honor those individuals and organizations who have made an impact on the quality of health care within the state. The winners were selected by the publisher and editors of The Daily Record.

"Dr. Bartolo is an outstanding registered nurse who exceeds in his leadership abilities within the MNA and the nursing profession. He has an incredible impact on the MNA, our healthcare system, our patients, and our communities. His dedication and commitment to excellence are truly remarkable. He exemplifies professionalism

by being an ambassador for Maryland nursing nationally and locally.

"Dr. Bartolo is an extraordinary champion for educating Maryland nurses and healthcare professionals on structural racism. The American Nurses Association (ANA) awarded him a grant to develop training materials and advocacy work to pursue his goal. Dr. Bartolo's proposal was one of the eight awarded among all applicants throughout the United States. He is the reason there is House Bill 0783/Senate Bill 0458 titled "Health Occupations—Structural Racism Training," which proposes changes to the training requirements for health care professionals in Maryland.

Key provisions include:

- Requiring applicants for renewal of certain licenses and certificates to attest that they have completed an implicit bias and structural racism training program approved by the Cultural and Linguistic Health Care Professional Competency Program;

- Expanding the definition of "implicit bias" to include structural racism; and,

- Ensuring that the training programs are recognized by health occupations boards or accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education." Read More

The Club conducted a wide-ranging search for candidates for the Award. It assumed that the quality of community life can be enhanced through a wide range of activity, such as journalism, education, the arts, healthcare, business, religion, and charitable work. The Club did not favor any particular lane of service.



What especially recommended Geoffrey Thomas to the Club is his long and dedicated service to the Boy Scouts of America, which has always nurtured personal virtues indispensable to good relations in the community. Thomas has shown a strong commitment to building character and unity in our community by nurturing in young people the kind of character traits that make them self-reliant, dependable, confident, and resourceful but also modest and responsible members of society. The Boy Scouts standards of personal conduct overlap remarkably with the Rotary Four-Way-Test. As one member of the search committee put it, "Thomas has been training future Rotarians."

DC Rotary Club's Pollinator Garden Planted on National Mall

The **Rotary Club of Washington**, **D.C.** got a bit greener on Friday, April 25th, when DC Rotarians and the National Park Service (NPS) installed its long-awaited Rotary Pollinator Garden at the World War II Memorial on the Mall. The new Rotary pollinator garden will enhance the landscape and provide habitat for bees and other wildlife. The NPS invited about a dozen volunteers from the Northrop Grumman and Friends of the National Mall to help with the planting. It was filmed by NBC-4 on April 25th and **Past President Bill Dent** was interviewed on camera and gave a history of the DC Rotary Club Peter Gilsey Trees for the Capital program and our



partnership with the National Park Service. **DC Rotary member Dan Mitrovich** helped with media.









The NPS hired a professional landscaper to design and plot out the planting and chose an amazing 716 native shrubs, trees, perennials, ornamental grasses, and bulbs -- all of which Rotarians and NPS volunteers planted today. **DC Rotary members May and Sam** teamed up to plant the biggest shrubs -- Henry's Garnet Sweetspire and Gro-Low Fragrant Sumac.

Disaster Update - Getting Ready for the Hurricane Season

District 7620 Disaster Relief Committee continues to coordinate with Disaster Aid USA to respond to disasters. We are addressing disasters almost year-round within



USA and internationally. Currently, we are getting ready for the Hurricane season. Over a dozen trailers equipped with emergency equipment and tools (such as personal protective equipment, chain saws, generators, water pumps, wheel barrels, shovels, rakes, hand tools, etc.) are pre-positioned around the USA to handle faster deployment of volunteers, after a Hurricane strikes any part of the country. To support such relief work, money and supplies are always needed; and we request that you and your club consider donating money to DAUSA. Process of Deployment: When Disaster strikes, Disaster Aid USA and the District Disaster Committee respond in a timely manner. The Scouting Team and Rescue Boat crew deploy during the very first phase. Following that other teams deploy when the Scouting Team calls for help in aiding the survivors who are left with unprecedented losses of their homes and belongings due to high wind, rain and/or flooding. Typically, volunteers (aka Muckers and Gutters) go to clean out damaged homes. Water is usually pumped out of flooded homes. All water damaged articles are then removed from the flooded homes (e.g., furniture, clothes, and appliances). Water-soaked drywall is typically removed 2 feet above water marks, and total removal of drywall is sometimes done, including insulation. To dry out the homes, numerous floor fans and large 36-inch high-velocity fans along with dehumidifiers are used. DAUSA has a very special trailer which can dry out a home within 24 hours. This trailer has a furnace back-up that blows super-heated air. In case there is roof damage DAUSA team provides tarp over the roof as temporary measure. In addition, DAUSA has a Backhoe/front-end loader, stationed in Louisiana ready for use for lifting or moving fallen trees and for taking logs and debris to the curbside for pickup. So, we are ready for the upcoming Hurricane season. Read More

INDIA TRIP - 2026



You are invited to join a fun-filled group tour of eastern India. In Feb 2026, Paul Mahata of Mt Airy Club (in coordination with the district) is organizing an India trip for interested Rotarians and Rotaractors and their guests. TRIP DETAILS:

- Visiting three Rotary global grant project sites in Purulia, India. These projects were supported by 23 Rotary clubs of district 7620.
- Attending the opening of a Rotary library, jointly operated by Purulia Rotary club and a local Trust.
- Going on a special tour of eastern India which includes:
 - Kolkata (Calcutta) and its impressive monuments (such as Victoria Memorial)
 - Sundarbans Tiger Reserve (home of Royal Bengal Tigers), and
 - Darjeeling tea gardens in the slopes of the Himalayan Range
- Other Options being considered: a) tour opportunities to other parts of India, and b) vaccinating children on Polio Vaccine Day

Expected cost for this fun-filled trip is \$2,500/person, including air fare. A similar group tour of India was organized in 2020, and it was a grand success. Five Rotarians had joined in to visit northern India's "Golden Triangle". Commitment window to make the India trip-2026 closes by May 16, 2025.

Final Reports for District Grants are due by 15 May 2025!



All Final Reports for 2024-25 District community grants are due 15 May. Please submit them in DACdb with supporting documentation.

Per Rotary's Grant Terms and Conditions, an acceptable Final Report must include:

Project Impact – Describe how the project advanced the goals of the selected area(s) of focus. Be sure to include the **number of beneficiaries** reached.

- 2. **Objectives & Outcomes** Provide a summary of how the project met the specific objectives outlined in your grant application, the metrics you used, and any data collected.
- 3. **Sustainability** Explain how the results of the project will be sustained over time.
- 4. **Collaboration** Outline the roles of host and international partners, as well as any cooperating organizations.
- 5. **Financial Report** Submit a detailed account of all expenditures. **Upload invoices dated after 1 July** that reflect spending consistent with the approved budget (or as close to the full grant amount as possible).

We recognize that projects may have encountered delays or needed adjustments. The Grants Committee will accept deviations from the original scope or budget as long as they align with the project's overall purpose. Please include a brief explanation of any changes made.

Submission Process:

- Final Reports must be submitted via DACdb.
- Some fields will autofill based on your original application; please review and update them with what actually occurred.

• Upload **supporting documentation** to help the Grants Committee verify completion and compliance with the grant requirements.

Once your report is reviewed and approved, the remaining 50% of awarded DDF funds will be released. The earlier you submit and receive approval, the sooner the balance will be disbursed.
