Rotary at Its Best – Partnerships

Those reading page 16 of the June Rotarian magazine may have noticed an article which reads in part, “Mexico, in the small fishing village of San Felipe on the Baja Peninsula... (local) Rotarians, assisted by the RC of Shasta Valley (Yreka) California, arranged an \$81,500 three-year global grant project ... that funded 107 cataract surgeries and 88 other eye procedures.”

But the story has not ended, this January, our Rotarians were back at our District Grants meeting in Roseburg for another grant. In just a few months they have delivered surgical equipment and began performing more surgeries.



The new project has already accomplished the following:

1. The first screening Eye Clinic for this grant was on Saturday, April 28, 2018 and set a new record for patients seen – 258. There were 23 people referred for eye surgery.
2. The next day, Sunday, the surgeon, Dr. Abbud, did 6 cataract surgeries and removed 4 pterygiums in Dr. Abasolo's office in San Felipe. Traditionally these have been done in Ensenada, a 2.5-hour drive away, and involved over-night stays, meals, etc. This local option for surgery is a new feature of this grant, and is possible because of a partner, Dr. Abasolo, who can offer storage and his operating room for the project.
3. The following day, Monday, the surgery patients were rechecked and 19 other patients were screened with lens studies for anticipated

surgery at the end of May. Dr. Abbud also removed 4 more pterygiums, and treated 3 people with Zaltrap injections for diabetic retinopathy.

4. More referred patients are to be seen in San Felipe on May 30, 2018.
5. On May 31, 2018, Dr. Abudd has scheduled 16 additional cataract surgeries in San Felipe, and on June 1, 2018 more pterygium surgeries are planned.

How was all of this accomplished? By developing extensive, consistent, active, and long-term participation with all of the following:

- The RC of San Felipe and District 4100
 - Shasta Valley Rotary from our district 5110
 - The RC of Minneapolis University, District 5950.
 - Past RI President, Frank Devlyn, who contributed \$3,000 for this project from his Donor Advised Fund (DAF)
 - The local Lion's Club in San Felipe.
 - The Lion's Club from the California Central Valley who supply the ophthalmologist.
 - The Rotary Action Group of Flying Samaritans.
 - San Felipe and visiting Rotarian volunteers, including Anne and David Herfindahl from District 5110
- and
- Local San Felipe physicians, Dr. Abasolo and Dr. Marcelo Abbud.

Rotary doesn't just bring money to a project, we bring management expertise – Rotary and Rotarians at our best.

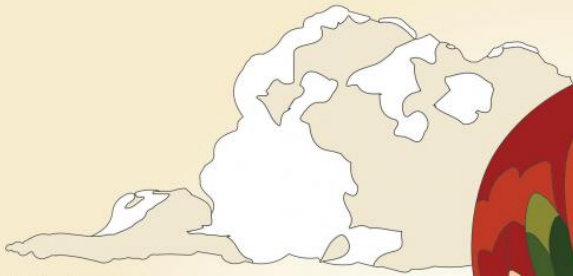
