important source of support for youth and family charities. Visitors, friends, businesses and the people of our Central Oregon community enjoyed this fun event and raised \$89,485.

Rotary clubs has begun distributing the funds to their selected recipients. The Bend chose to support Bend's Bethlehem Inn construction of a new kitchen, Transforming Lives Together Capital Campaign. The Bethlehem Inn is a supported emergency shelter that provides a warm, safe place to sleep, meals, and case management services for adults and children experiencing homelessness in Central Oregon.

Club of Bend – Mount Bachelor is sending its Duck Race dollars to The Center for the Center Foundation supports sports medicine assistance, including head injury concussion diagnosis, for youth in our local schools.

Club of Bend-High Desert selected the Bethlehem Inn kitchen construction and Family Relief Nursery as Duck Race funds recipients. Mountain Star Family's mission is to prevent child abuse and neglect through community support services that help vulnerable children and families succeed.

Club of Greater Bend is supporting DAWN's (Directly Assisting Women Newly Grandmother's House and Community Shower Truck. DAWN's House supports women coming from addiction and alcoholism through structured, guided, sober living. Grandmother's house will use funds for a new HVAC (heating, ventilation and air conditioning) in their home that provides mothers and babies emergency and shelter to homeless or abused pregnant, parenting young mothers, and young women seeking adoption for their child. Community Shower Truck will purchase an older truck, doubling their capacity to provide mobile showers to the homeless.

Rotarians, working together, decided to donate their portion of the Duck Race to support six "Unity Challenge Days" in the middle schools and high schools of Central Oregon. Unity programs in schools help prevent bullying and teen suicide.

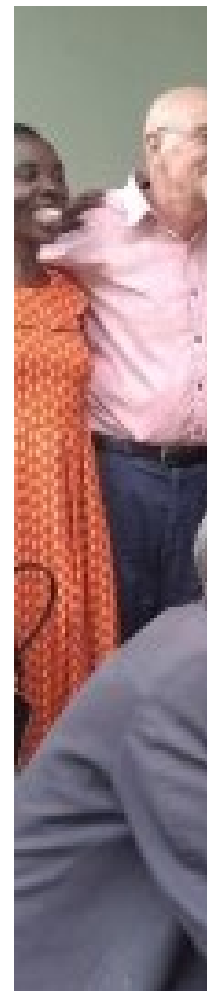

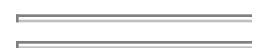
Million Rwandans died in a 100-day genocide. Today, despite having the highest unemployment rate in Africa and 80% of the people living as subsistence farmers, Rwanda is a role model for Africa. They have national healthcare and family planning, and are considered one of the safest countries in Africa, litter free communities, and a safety net for the vulnerable. There is no government corruption or tribalism. The New York Times noted that Rwanda is a success story in Africa, if not the world has so thoroughly turned itself around in so short a time.

Since Rwanda has no natural resources other than people, it is striving to become an IT, telecommunication, and business center for East Africa. That requires English, and 9 years ago the national language switched from French to English. Today, only about 7% of the population can converse in English. Teachers' English is at about the 2nd grade level, even though they must teach all subjects in English starting in 4th grade.

The goal of the Rwanda English Project is to increase the spoken English skills of teachers. We began with two rural schools in Mayange where 49 teachers put in four hours a day for the eight weeks of their summer vacation. 12 January was graduation day. In English post-test scores were three times higher than their pretest scores and participants clearly indicated they felt they learned a lot of English and they want more.

Eleven teachers attained sufficient English skills to be trained as instructors of the spoken English program. Starting 29 January, they will continue the English instruction with the remaining 38 teachers for 1.5 hours a day during lunch break and after school. Through an REP model school project at a nearby reconciliation, a coach will be available for weekly supervision of the instructors. REP trainers will be back for at least one extended training

first trimester break.

In conjunction with the reconciliation school project, three of the Mayange instructors will spend three months at orphanages in Kenya where REP personnel manage the programs. The instructors will be immersed in English, will teach spoken English, and will be trained and supervised to teach other programs in English. Every three months a different group of three instructors will intern in Kenya.

The Rwanda English Project was funded by Southtowne Rotary and several other national donations. Future project goals include funding this program through training current instructors to other schools as new instructors reach proficiency; conducting a week summer session next December/January with additional schools; and training more instructors to be trainers and project managers.

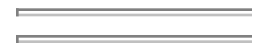

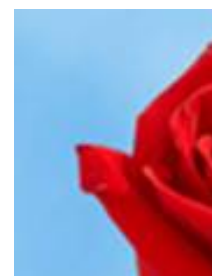
