This 3rd week of sharing information on our district committees focus on our two biggest grant programs. TRF estimates that clubs in our district and district projects have totaled over \$11 million dollars for 437



separate international projects over the last 24 years. Many years our projects receive more grant money than our members have donated. We sponsor more projects than any other district in our zone.

GRANTS - Eric Hodnett

Rotary Foundation grants support Rotarians and Rotary clubs in their educational and humanitarian efforts both locally and around the world.



DISTRICT GRANTS - Juli Di Chiro

District Grants may be used for local community or international projects. They are intended for smaller projects and must be completed within eighteen months. They do not require an international partner, but still require active Rotarian involvement. Grants may be used for:

- Humanitarian projects, including service travel and disaster recovery efforts,
- Scholarships for any level, length of time, place, or area of study.
- Vocational training of any team size or time span.

Preliminary applications must be received each year by June 1st. This year we were able to give \$119,140 to 71 projects for projects totaling over \$550,000. But for the 2nd year in a row we did not have enough to support all grant applications. A BIG thank you to those clubs who voluntarily withdrew their applications. They will receive first preference in 2017-18.



GLOBAL GRANTS – Steve Marks

Global grants support large, multi-year international activities with sustainable, measurable outcomes in one or more of the six Areas of Focus and must have minimum budget of \$30,000. Clubs must also partner with a club in another country. District application forms need to be received at least 10 days prior to a quarterly Grants Meeting. The next Grant Meeting dates are January 14th, and March 25th.

Happy Thanksgiving Week!

We are now into our 2nd month of this year's Dictionary Project. As of today (November 18) 35 clubs have sent in orders for 9,656 dictionaries for distribution to third graders in 162 schools. These numbers lag what we achieved in the last two years where our school count was 220 -222. So this indicates there are still a lot of Third Graders in our District Elementary Schools who are being deprived of receiving a personal dictionary. Literacy has always been a high priority in our Rotary World. Dictionaries are a means of enhancing literacy skills at an early age and Rotary Clubs are in a prime position to provide a means of encouragement.

If there are third grade classes in your community not being covered, check it out and participate! Remember the District covers the cost of the dictionaries and book plates to personalize the dictionary to the student – no cost to the clubs. Dictionaries and book plates are shipped to your designated delivery site. In addition to the English language dictionaries, we are also making an English-Spanish version available should you have schools with ESL programs. Let's go – there is no deadline for participation; just send me the completed order form and go for it!

The Southtowne Hospital Supply

The Southtowne Hospital Supply Project began in 2009 when Rotarian Lauren Alexander searched for a suitcase of bed linens for a club member to take to Uganda. This effort resulted in a donation of 3 pickup loads from PeaceHealth, with an offer for more. The word spread that Southtowne had an abundance of hospital linens and Rotary clubs in Coos Bay, Albany, and Corvallis contacted Southtowne for shipments to several countries.

With the "Rotary" connection, PeaceHealth offered other items they disposed of—virtually every item ever used in a hospital. Those items were shared with other Rotary clubs shipping containers overseas and with Medical Mission groups needing a suitcase full of items to take on volunteer trips. Our success

groups needing a suit case full of items to take on volunteer trips. Our success led to a huge offer of large equipment when the University District hospital in Eugene closed--beds, exam tables, procedure tables, medical refrigerators, IV poles, and other large items.

To date, Southtowne has shipped containers of hospital supplies to Ghana, Democratic Republic of Congo, Uganda, Honduras, Ivory Coast, and Ethiopia. The latest 40' container left on November 2nd for a hospital in Nigeria. This shipment was for the non-profit CardioStart, whose director estimated the value at \$500,000.

We are currently working on establishing a statewide network of similar projects. We will help interested clubs get local hospital supply projects started so that together we can fill more requests.

Peaceful Schools Program

The Rotary Club of Port Orford is excited to announce the launching of the Rotary Peaceful Schools Program (PSP) in conjunction with Driftwood Elementary and Pacific High School.

The program is delivered in the elementary school classrooms, in four separate 45- minute sessions, typically scheduled 2-4 weeks apart. A team of 4-6 high school student volunteers trained to deliver the program are assigned to each classroom. One or more trained Rotarians coordinate and oversee the program. The program begins with a brief overview of the Rotary 4-way Test, which has been renamed as the “Four Awesome Questions” (FAQs). These questions, which are provided on a poster for the classroom, are:

Before you think, say or do something, ask yourself:

1. Is it true?
2. Is it fair to everyone?
3. Will it help make better friends
4. Will it be good for everyone?



The program uses developmentally appropriate social-emotional learning curriculum to help children and youth express their feelings constructively, build community, resolve conflict peacefully, and celebrate diversity.

Before you think, say or do something, ask yourself:

1. Is it **TRUE**?
2. Is it **FAIR** to everyone?
3. Will it help build **FRIENDSHIPS**?
4. Will it be good for **EVERYONE**?
