## The View From a Wildlife Photographer

When Steve and I walked out over a grassy patch of lawn to an unassuming shed during the Point Reyes Open Studios last November, we had no idea what we d find. In a day of discovering the creativity and ingenuity of this community, we had left our visit to this artist until last. When we opened the door and were assaulted with photos of owls flying right at us, coyotes in midair about to pounce on a mole, hundreds of Marbled Godwits settled on a pier in a where s Waldo? moment. we knew this was the best ending for our Thanksgiving weekend as well as an opportunity to introduce Carlos Porrata to our Rotarian friends.

So, last Wednesday, over Zoom, with his background of having worked for 30 years as a California State Park Ranger, Carlos took us though some moments in time with his exquisite photography and gift of story-telling. We experienced everything from a sunset at Drakes Beach with silhouettes of the Tule Elk, a majestic Great Blue Heron, and a 5000 pound bull elephant seal. In the Central Valley, we saw White Fronted Geese and Sandhill Cranes, Pin Tail Ducks with their blue stripes, Red-Tailed Hawks, sibling owlets posed as if for their portraits, and egrets engaging in **③**opportunistic feeding **④** in the wake of a backhoe. We saw an American Kestrel eating a lizard for lunch, bobcats on a hunt, the recessive gene of a blue-eyed coyote. At Moss Landing we enjoyed the antics of the sea otters and again were captivated by the exquisite detail of his photography.



Carlos shared captivating stories with his photographs. One was a coyote crossing the sand dunes having a close encounter with a river otter family playing on the banks. We were held in suspense when the coyote disappears in the grass and relief when he returns, not with a river otter but the carcass of a pelican. He showed us the drama of a female Great Horned Owl who, midair, catches the feet of a juvenile Barn Owl who, fortunately, pulls away just in time.

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
