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Less Than a Week to go for a Polio-Free Year in Pakistan. Stay Tuned.

The last recorded case of the wild polio virus in Pakistan was January 15, 2021. If we get through another week, we may have achieved the first week free of wild polio in that country's history. We'll keep you posted. The government will probably want a month or more for late reports to come in from the field. Vaccine-derived cases, a small element of polio in the past, were down 46% this year so far, now that we have a new vaccine. Keep your fingers crossed! It will leave only Afghanistan as a country to eliminate polio and it has not reported new cases beyond the four this year that I reported in my last report to the club.

Taxation, Inequality, and My Time in Paris

Martha Fiehn was born in Berlin, Germany and grew up in Davis, California. She graduated with Honors in Economics from UC Berkeley in 2019 and, after graduating, volunteered as an English teacher in an indigenous community near Coca, Ecuador. Upon returning to the US, she worked at the local Bay Area nonprofit JVS. Thanks to the support of the Rotary Foundation Global Scholar grant, she has been able to pursue her Master's in International Economic Policy at Sciences Po, Paris School of International Affairs. Currently, she is a research fellow at the Harvard Social Economics Lab and writing her Master's thesis on tax evasion.

Martha joined us from Paris and discussed how tax policy can be used to create a more

equitable distribution of wealth. There are opportunities prior to the application of our tax system, opportunities within the system, and opportunities in the policies of post-tax social spending.

- The pre-tax wealth re-distribution opportunity includes fundamental social spending that benefits everyone, such as support for public education, minimum wage policies, and trade policies.
- The tax structure includes both regressive taxes (such as sales/consumption tax and payroll/Medicare taxes) and progressive taxes (income taxes). The latter can be considered to be a mechanism of wealth redistribution.
- The post-tax wealth re-distribution opportunity includes social programs that provide direct benefits from the government to eligible individuals.

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
