Secrets from the Rotary Attic

At the Past Presidents' Meeting last week, Beth Roessner (2018-19) introduced the program, and our witty emcee, Ed Church (2004-05), described the myriad of Berkeley Rotary paraphernalia and memorabilia accumulated over the years. The collection contains everything from an actual rotary phone ("answered" by Ed to a call from Paul Harris on his way to contacting the 46,000 clubs worldwide) to an autographed photograph of Admiral Nimitz (former Berkeley Rotary Club member) signing the Japanese surrender on the USS Missouri in 1945.



After describing the several moves of accumulated "stuff," Ed said that it is now housed in two locations: Shar's Garage (which has newly installed shelving thanks to Grier Graff, et al) and the Collignon's basement. It has been "decluttered" and, in the first round of organization, separated it into five categories: Club Rosters, Bound Books of bulletins and newsletters, Events, History, and Banners. It now awaits helping hands to continue to declutter, organize, and catalogue. There is a movement afoot to catalogue all this wonderful history and then, hopefully, have an exhibit at Berkeley Historical Museum.

It was wonderful to see in person both Past Presidents Alan Fraser (1973-74) and Mary Alice Rathbun (2006-07) after a long hiatus. They were joined in the room by Rick Betts (1982-83), Peter Campbell (1995-96), Pate Thomson (2005-06), Grier Graff (2013-14), O'Neil Dillon (2014-15), Anne Pardee (2015-16), Maxim Schrogin (2016-17), Tina Etcheverry (2017-18), Arlene Marcus (2021-22), and current President Joan Collignon (2022-23). Larry Goldenberg (2003-04), Judith Glass (2009-10), and Fred Collignon (2010-11) joined us on Zoom along with our first woman President, Barbara D'Anneo (1997-98), who led us on a trip down memory lane and sang a fantastic rendition of the 4-way test set to the tune of "Take Me Out to Ballgame."

Berkeley Rep's School of Theater

On January 25, the club learned about the Berkeley Repertory Theatre's School of Theater from Director Anthony Jackson. Jackson, who has an impressive background in theater as an



actor, director, producer, and educator, is enthusiastic about providing access to the arts to everyone. The school does just that, offering free or low-cost programs for children and adults in Berkeley and the Bay Area.

Surprising to many of us, the School of Theater has been around for 25 years, serving over

300,000 persons since its beginning. It operates out of the Berkeley Rep's theaters on Addison Street and will soon have studio space in West Berkeley as well. Its programs include:

- A Teen Council, which helps plan programming for Teen Nights and provides leadership and advocacy.
- Teen nights: On the first Fridays of the month, offering performances for 100 teens at \$10 each.
- Outreach: In-school residencies offered free or at low cost.
- High School Theater Festival for grades 9-12: A new program in which students write and perform their own short plays.
- Story Builders (grades 2-5) and Change Makers (grades 5-7).
- Student matinees: serving 3000 students per year who attend a performance and talk with artists afterward.
- Dig-In: A new digital initiative, offering classes and performances online.
