How is the Club Doing on this Year's Foundation Goals?

Several newer members have asked why the Foundation Committee doesn't do regular reports on how the club is doing on our fundraising goals. While we think we, RI, and the Rotarian magazine overwhelm you with our buzz on the Foundation and its programs, here's an update as requested on our progress on the club fundraising goals announced at the Foundation club program in November.

Annual Fund giving, which returns to the clubs for projects. We've raised \$35,751 through January, surpassing last year's 12-month Annual Fund giving of \$26,266, which was a major gain over the prior year of under \$20,000. The Committee's goal this year was to hit \$40,000, approaching our regular giving for years up to 2018-19, when we usually donated \$50,000+ each year. We should achieve the \$40,000+ based on various promised giving that hasn't yet been received. But we will again push hard in May and June, as we approach the end of our fiscal year. Read More

Working for Peace

Last Wednesday the Club received a presentation by the Peace Committee of its activities past, present, and future and those of Rotary International on behalf of world peace. After an introduction by chairman Maxim Schrogin, we learned from David Campbell about Rotary International's commitment to peacebuilding. It has teamed with organizations around the world to address conflict; it has created a Peace Scholars program, and, through the Rotary Action Group for Peace, works with hundreds of clubs to create programs and activities geared to the promotion of peace.

We then learned from David Malcolm about the history of the Rotary International Peace Grove



in Berkeley's Tilden Park. Established in 1955 concurrent with the closure of a Nike missile base, our club dedicates each year one of the hundred Sequoias planted to an individual or organization that has taken positive action to foster international peace and understanding. Maxim then presented slides of some of the ceremonies we have hosted at the Peace Grove, emphasizing the cultural background of the awardee. Ken Renroth reported on the current troubling state of the grove due in part to the drought. <u>Read More</u>
