Transforming the Hospital de la Familia Eye Clinic in Guatemala

On March 2, Dr. Andrew Sorenson, Chief of Opthalmology at Alta Bates Medical Center, gave a report on the Hospital de la Familia Eye Clinic in Nuevo Progreso, Guatemala, which Berkeley Rotary has been supporting since the 1990s. The clinic serves approximately three million of Guatemala's eighteen million citizens.

To fully address preventable blindness in the Nuevo Progresso area, the World Health Organization (WHO) has determined that a rate of 3,000 cataract surgeries per million people per year is required, which equates to 9000 such surgeries annually for the clinic's patient population. Until 2015, all cataract surgeries were performed by North American teams, who were able to complete approximately 500 procedures--laudable, but well below the WHO guidelines. Read More
