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How We Can Help Stop Climate Change

The Berkeley Rotary Climate Action Team (BRCAT) gave a presentation on March 23, educating and inspiring us to become more active in and conscientious about mitigating climate change in the context of our Rotary Club and as individuals.

Prof. Astrid Kiendler-Scharr opened the presentation with a brief overview of the current state of knowledge regarding climate change. She informed us about the increase in temperature change since 1850 and delineated

sources of warming, particularly noting that methane remains in our atmosphere after being released for a considerably shorter period of time than does carbon dioxide. After 1000 years after release, one fourth of CO2 is left in the atmosphere, while after 100 years following release, there is hardly any methane left.

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
