The History and Impact of I-House

On March 29 we heard from Joe Lurie, Emeritus Director of Cal's International House. Few people know that UC Berkeley's I House was involved in very early efforts toward desegregating Berkeley, both the campus and the city. It was the first integrated and first coed living center west of NYC, where I House started. Residents of Cal's I House over the years have had a national impact on social progress.



Nationally, I House began with Harry Edmonds

in NYC in 1909. Edmonds was near Columbia University and saw a Chinese student. When he said "Hello," the student replied, "You are the first person who has spoken to me in three weeks." Edmonds decided to begin what are referred to as Sunday suppers, to bring together students and others from different backgrounds and nationalities. These suppers continue to this day. In 1924, with the help of J.D. Rockefeller, Edmonds opened the first International House in NYC.

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Using AI Technology in Weather Forecasting

The club speaker on April 5 was Alexander Levy, co-founder of Atmo, a Berkeley-based firm that provides weather and climate forecasting information to governments and other clients using artificial intelligence (AI). Alexander had previously co-founded and served as Chief Operating Officer for a leading AI pharmaceutical company. He has also advised or invested in companies that use "science fiction technology" to solve problems facing humanity.

Currently, AI technology is increasingly replacing numerical weather forecasting, the previous approach since 1980, as the dominant practice. The AI approach uses weather data over the prior 30 years to project the weather for an area. The data is collected for a much greater number of small geographic areas—maybe 100 times the collection areas than used under the prior technology. Future weather is predicted from the past weather that emerged following similar prior conditions. The firm has developed the models and provides data for weather forecasting for the Bay Area, the Caribbean, and for large countries like Uganda. As a more accurate, detailed, and affordable technology, AI-developed data and weather forecasting is predicted to be used worldwide in coming years.

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
