about whether Rotary ever excluded minorities. I've often heard at the Historians Fellowship at RI that membership was always open to all vetted community leaders from the outset.

By 1931, there was not yet an African-American member in our club. The president that year-a minister in town—conceded that his greatest disappointment was not securing the first Black member of the club. He appreciated that club leaders supported his efforts, but it appeared that none of the Black business leaders in town who were asked to join accepted the offer. (This was an era when, at each Board meeting, the Board would propose leaders whom the Membership Committee should approach about membership.) Read More

Berkeley Art Center: A Local Treasure

Our April 12 speaker was Kim Acebo Arteche, co-director of the Berkeley Art Center (BAC). The BAC was a gift of the Berkeley Rotary Club to the City of Berkeley in 1967, in celebration of the 50th anniversary of the club.

After describing the beauty of the Center, including the warmth of the wood construction



and the intimate exhibition space, she presented us with a review of some of the more notable exhibits over the years. The Art Center

showcases artists who are in the early to mid stage of their careers. These artists tend not to be showcased in the major museums. The BAC is an ideal platform for them to add to their resume. Because of its small size and local venue, BAC is able to explore art forms that might not otherwise be put on exhibit. Exhibits have ranged from somewhat traditional art to more experimental forms.

Notable exhibits have included Black collectibles, prints by women artists, dance, music and spoken word, sound art, and an exhibit of an aluminum foil pyramid with a real egg! The current exhibit is an interactive art presentation and experience.

If you have not visited the Berkeley Art Center, please consider putting it in your schedule. It is located in Live Oak Park, open Wednesday through Sunday, from 11:00 AM to 5:00 PM, and



there is no admission fee. This is a Berkeley treasure, blessed by the fact that Berkeley Rotary gave it to the City, no strings attached.
