In Memoriam: Don Alter

I am sad to report the death of devoted Rotarian and long-time friend of many club members, Don Alter. He died on May 12 of a head injury acquired as the result of a fall in his apartment at Piedmont Gardens. He was 89 years old.

Don was born in Omaha, Nebraska, an identical twin, and moved to Berkeley at age 5, attending Berkeley schools and graduating from UC Berkeley with a bachelor's degree in business. He married in 1958 and is survived by his wife Peggy, his grown children David and Kim, 3 grandchildren, and his brother David.

Don had a distinguished professional career,

retiring as Director of Corporate Accounting for the University of California system.

He joined Rotary in November 1994 and was active on many important boards and committees, including serving as treasurer of the Endowment. There his organization of the endowment records and transactions was brilliant and served as a model on how to do it. He handled the Jim Reynolds scholarships, keeping in close touch with the Reynolds family, and is responsible in many ways for the success of that program. Read More
