
By Frederick C. Collignon What is Vocational Service?

In the minutes and newsletters from the club's founding in 1915 through the 1980s, much attention was paid to "vocational service" as one of the major kinds of service, including community service, international service, youth service, and club service. The waning emphasis or even discussion of vocational service was apparent in the 1990s. An intentional effort was made to revive it in the early 2000s by club speakers like Cliff Dochterman and visiting District Governors and at District and Rotary International conferences and assemblies. We hear about vocational service infrequently now, and RI focuses more on specific types of efforts and impacts, like health, education, peace, economic development, environmental sustainability, and the like, each tied to Rotary objectives.

On May 31, Jeff Johnson, a retired Assistant Professor of Computer Science at USF, spoke to us about "Designing User Interfaces for an Aging Population". Jeff is a recognized expert in humancomputer interaction, that is, user interfaces to machines. He has authored articles on a variety of topics in Human-Computer Interaction, as well as the books "GUI Bloopers" (1st and 2nd eds.), "Web Bloopers", "Designing with the Mind in Mind" (1st, 2nd, and 3rd eds.), "Conceptual Models: Core to Good Design" (written with

Technology Eras

Austin Henderson, 2nd edition in the works). Jeff has also, with Dr. Kate Finn, written the book "Designing User Interfaces for an Aging Population," the subject of his talk.

Sociologists tell us that people come in cultural "generations," with different cultural patterns. Technology also comes in "eras," with different interaction styles. Technology eras overlap with cultural generations, but they do not align. In doing the research for their book, Jeff and Kate discovered that most people are comfortable with using the technology from the first era that they encountered during their "formative years" - ages 10 to 28. Those of any generation will generally not be comfortable with technologies of later eras. Read More
