For more than 30 years, a growing community of artists, makers, and creative problem-solvers from around the world have gathered each August in Nevada's Black Rock Desert to build a temporary city dedicated to immediacy, participation, and creative self-expression. Black Rock City is a vibrant social, civic, and cultural experiment that has given rise to a movement now active in 37 countries and on six continents. At the heart of



everything Burning Man is the relentless pursuit of creativity, which manifests itself each year in the form of more than 400 large-scale interactive sculptures, 800 art cars (or "mutant vehicles"), 1,400 self-organized theme camps, and thousands of interactive performances, workshops, elaborate outfits, and spontaneous interactions. Join Leslie to learn firsthand about the creative community spirit that goes into building a temporary city in the desert, the lasting impact the experience has on those who participate, and the growing influence it's having far beyond the "trash fence." # End-of-Year Appeals on 3-2-1

As we did last year and in some prior years, members will get email appeals this month as the fiscal 2022-23 year ends to make donations to the Rotary Foundation and the Club Endowment. Last week an appeal went out to those who committed to the \$100 annual pledge drives for the Polio Warrior Society but who hadn't yet donated this year. Most of those called were happy to be reminded. Appeals will also go out in coming weeks to: (a) those who haven't donated to the Foundation or the Endowment this year (the 3-2-1 annual appeal); (b) those lacking their first Paul Harris, reminding them to take advantage of the largest club matching ever offered those members; and (c) those past Paul Harris Society members who have yet to complete their \$1000 pledge this year.

It is easy to pay the "3" of the 3-2-1 annual club ask (\$300 to the Berkeley Rotary Endowment). Give your check made out to "Berkeley Rotary Endowment" to Jackie

Hammond or Tina Etcheverry at a club meeting; mail it to Tina Etcheverry at 1471 Greenwood Terrace, Berkeley 94708; or donate online using the Donate button on the club website.

The easy way to donate the "2" of 3-2-1 (\$200 to the Rotary Foundation, to which all Rotarians belong) is to make your check out to "The Rotary Foundation" and give it to Jackie, Tina, or Fred Collignon. They'll get your check to Fred who, as a past club Foundation Chair, will fill out the paperwork and send it to Evanston, so you and the club are credited for the donation. If you do Rotary Direct or have created your My Rotary account, it's easy to donate online to Rotary. If not, why not create your My Rotary account now? Google "My Rotary" and the instructions for creating the account come up. If you need help, contact Fred. He's filling in for our current Foundation Chair, Jason Russell, who's traveling for most of June. Beware of donating online to the Foundation unless you do it with your Rotary ID number, the club number (428) and the District number (5160). Otherwise, you and the club won't get credit for your donation.

# Propaganda and the Generation Gap in Russia

What Might Help to Fight It? (and how can we help?)

- Inclusion, communication to open access to alternative information
- Increase social connections of "weak" type to open access to other points of view
- Reaffirm the sense of control and return the agency
- Media literacy, information hygiene

Valeria Chupina, our speaker last week, is a new club member who is from Russia. President Joan invited Valeria to give this talk following a personal conversation with her about the ways the war in Ukraine has opened up deep divisions between Valeria and her parents.

The result was last week's talk, which took us through scholarly and political

ideas, closing with personal themes relevant to all of us. Research shows that people vulnerable to propaganda are often isolated and lack a sense of agency. Indeed, an important design feature of propaganda machines is to intensify those very conditions. Read More
