Supporting Arts in Berkeley

Why are the arts important? Why (and how) should we support the arts in Berkeley? These are the questions explored by Susie Medak last Wednesday, launching a year under President Joan Collignon with the theme "Celebrating the Arts in Berkeley."

Medak, who has been Managing Director of the Berkeley Repertory Theater for 32 years, described the challenges faced by arts organizations during the pandemic. In the Bay Area, arts organizations rely on 60-80% of their budget coming from "earned income," including ticket sales, concessions, royalties, and service charges. For the Berkeley Repertory Theater, earned income is 70%. When arts venues were forced to shut down in 2020, overnight 70% of their revenue was gone, necessitating large layoffs of staff.

Many artists and artisans left the Bay Area because they could no longer afford to live here. Some left for more lucrative professions. Some artists stopped creating new art due to the stress of the pandemic and a loss of optimism. Medak pointed out that artists need a sense of security and the knowledge that their art will have an audience. Read More

Club's Foundation Giving 2021-22

We promised an end-of-the-year report on our club's Foundation giving. During the fiscal year ending June 30, Rotary International records us as having donated a total of \$77,771 to the Foundation, of which \$71,246 was donated to the Annual Shares Fund, which comes back in part in District grant money for club projects. Both are records for the club. Our previous high for overall Foundation giving was in the \$50,000 range, and for the Annual Shares program in the \$40,000 range. We achieved this level of annual giving



with a dozen fewer members than our previous high. In addition, the Foundation has already recorded \$1867 in club donations since June 30, from folks whose checks didn't arrive in time for the Every Rotarian Every Year (EREY) drive or who just added to their prior donations at the end of the year.

Donations were received by the Foundation from all members last year, another first for the club. Knowing some donations might not arrive in time by June 30, members donated in the name of those who had not yet donated, so we could achieve 100% club EREY. We were still receiving promised checks from the late donors this past week, and are grateful.

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
