Bubble, Bust, or the New Reality?

On July 13 Allison Teeman, real estate appraiser with Yovino-Young (www.yovinoyoung.com), spoke on Bubble, Bust, or the New Reality: A Look at the State of the High Demand for Local Real Estate Created by COVID, Millennials, and Cash.

Alison is a former Berkeley Rotarian. She was raised in Oxford, England, and graduated from University College, London, with a degree in law. She worked as a solicitor in London before moving to California in 1980. Because of her legal background, she often works as the courtappointed appraiser in real estate matters before the courts.

Alison spoke of the great challenges that Bay Area buyers encounter because of the excessive cost of homes here as compared to other areas of the U.S. Within the past year, there have been eight sales in Berkeley over \$4M, 16 between \$3M and \$4M, and 50 between \$2M and \$3M. The current median price of a home in Berkeley is \$1.5M. Twenty years ago, the median was \$500,000. The current median in California is around \$750,000.

Foundation 1.0.2. Where Does the Rotary Foundation's Money Go?

In this second installment, we'll discuss to what RI objectives the Foundation's money is directed. Rotary International now has seven objectives. In FY2018, there were only six and Foundation funds were allocated as follows;

Preventing Disease. \$35.7 million Providing Clean Water 18.8 million Supporting Education 11.0 million Growing Local Economies 10.8 million Saving Mothers and Children 7.2 million Promoting Peace 8.5 million

The 7th objective of Environmental Conservation was added subsquently, and \$18.4 million of Rotary's resources has gone to projects in that area. Over time, we'll provide examples of the kinds of projects funded under each objective.

See below for a brief summary of how clubs are involved in the projects that get funded under these objectives.

When the club raises donations for the Rotary Foundation, the money goes to Evanston. A good share comes back in funding for club projects if the club is skilled in grant writing and project design. Fortunately, our club has long been so skilled. Read More
