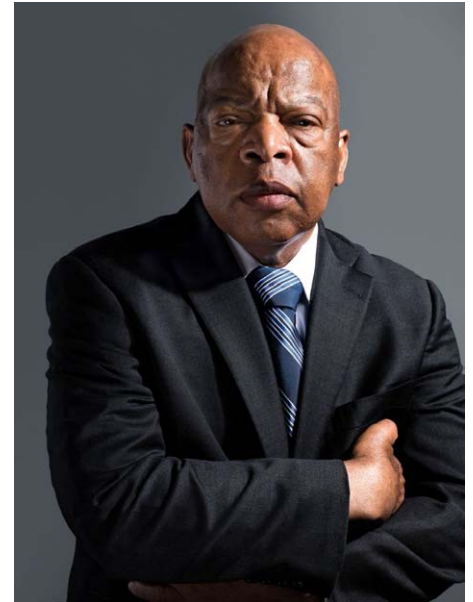

Marcia Dillon

Dr. Marcia Dillon has participated for many years in club activities with her husband Past President O'Neil. Marsha grew up in North Hollywood, CA. and attended UC Berkeley (1958-61) and then UC Med School (1961-1965). She married O'Neil in 1963 and served in the Peace Corps in Malaysia (1966-1968). Marcia and O'Neil have 3 sons. She completed her psychiatric internship, residency and psychoanalytic training, and then did private practice and also worked at the Ann Martin Children's Center (teaching and supervision). Marcia served as President of the San Francisco Psychoanalytic Institute and Society (1992-1994) and as a Board member. She retired in 2012.

Marcia played oboe and sang in community choruses for many years. Her current interests include grandmothing and family, music, reading, traveling, hiking, birding, fishing, camping, and mah jongg.



Kate Harrison

Kate Harrison is a Berkeley City Councilmember, representing District 4. She owns and manages Kate Harrison Consulting, specializing in strategic and financial planning, human resources management, and workflow analysis for justice agencies throughout the world. She has consulted for 31 California counties, eight states, and fourteen nations (through the World Bank, USAID and the U.N.). Her projects have included helping Native American foster youth in North Dakota, defendants without lawyers in Serbia, and people returning to their communities from prison. Before forming her firm, she held policy and executive positions in the San Francisco Mayor's Office under Art Agnos, and at the California Administrative Office of the Courts, where she helped develop the budget and



policies for California's \$1.7 billion-a-year court system. Kate earned her B.A. and Masters in Public Policy at Cal, and began her career as a member of a consulting practice evaluating the efficacy of local government operations throughout California. She has served as an elected member of the Berkeley City Council since 2017, with a focus on addressing climate change, housing, and homelessness and improved city services and budgeting.

Kate is a Board member of Berkeley Food and Housing, one of Berkeley's homeless service providers and the organization that is building the new Berkeley Way shelter. Her hobbies, some shared with her husband Jim, include international travel, yoga, gardening, music, and reading.

Dee Hubert (pictured above)

Dee Hubert has worked in research competition and grants administration at UC Berkeley for 21 years. She grew up in the East Bay and comes from a multi-cultural, diverse family. Although Dee had a fulltime job, she has long found time to help others as the co-founder and coordinator of the El Cerrito Neighborhood Food Bank Project with the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano (and Butte) counties. Since she was a teenager, her helping nature has encompassed working with children with disabilities, with youth who are economically and/or socially disadvantaged, and addressing food insecurity in the community. She studied to be a special education teacher, and worked with the Contra Costa County Summer Youth Employment Program developing jobs and counseling disadvantaged and disabled youth. She later worked for Quantas Airlines, which helped her explore the world, including periods of being stationed in Frankfurt, Germany, and Honolulu. Dee especially loves to travel in Germany, France, and England, particularly London.

Books, gardening, and travel are her top 3 hobbies, but she also loves theater, music, family genealogy, philosophy, European, African-American and African diaspora history and cultural anthropology.
