

# Mediators Beyond Borders, our Rotary partner, wins International Award

Our club's Peace Committee, led by Chair Maxim Scroggin, played a key role in helping Mediators Beyond Borders International (MBBI) become of Rotary International's partners. This week it was selected as the 2020 International Advocate for Peace awardee. We also learned this week that Rotarian Al Jubitz, who was the plenary speaker at our District Conference in Napa some years back was the recipient of the Ambassador John W. Donald Award for his work as a peace builder and for his "strategic systems approach to peacebuilding, social justice, and environmental stewardship." Al was one of the founders of the Peace Rotary Action Group and is now also a leader with MBBI now. It was a big award week for Rotary's peace groups, and we should take pride in Maxim's and the Peace Committee's work in making MBBI a Rotary peace partner.

## The En-ROADS Model

The club meeting on September 16 was exciting on a couple of levels. Disaster struck and Zoom failed us, but eventually our intrepid speakers were able to present a shortened version of their excellent talk to a small but enthusiastic crowd.

Heath Massey and Barbara Moulton came to us from Citizens Climate Lobby with a discussion of the En-ROADS Model, which offers simulations of different solutions to the climate crisis. This user-friendly climate model is freely available to anyone (see link below) and gives policymakers or the public the ability to explore the likely consequences of energy, economic growth, land use, and other policies and uncertainties, with the goal of improving their understanding. The simulation was developed by Climate Interactive and MIT Sloan, runs on an ordinary laptop, and is easy to figure out and run. It so a game really with the goal of lowering the temperature increase by 2100. The user is able to see on moving graphs what will happen to greenhouse gas emissions when for instance less coal or more nuclear energy is used.
