The award for 2023 goes to Greta Thunberg, a Swedish environmental activist who is known for challenging world leaders to take immediate action for climate change mitigation

(https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Greta\_Thunberg). Despite receiving annual nominations since 2018, Greta is not yet a Nobel Peace Laureate. This year, at least, she is the Berkeley Rotary Peace Laureate. The ceremony is presented by the Berkeley Rotary Peace Committee. (Note: We will not meet at First Pres.)



**About the Peace Grove.** In 1955, the Berkeley Rotary Club established the International Peace Grove in Tilden Regional Park by planting 100 Giant Sequoia seedlings close to the site of a former missile base. # The Plus in PolioPlus

Our speaker last week was Mike Crosby, the Rotary Zone 26 "End Polio Now Leader." He was one of 40 regional members worldwide who went above and beyond to help end polio. He and his wife, Marsha Brown, traveled to a slum area of India, where they vaccinated children for polio and other diseases.

Through his descriptive videos and engaging style of speaking, we were able to follow his journeys that highlighted areas susceptible to polio due to the lack of sanitation and the potential for contaminated food and water. We were able to see the brave women who were



going door-to-door to provide polio vaccination drops to children, sometimes in very dangerous rural areas.

The quest to end polio is not over. In 2023, there have been 5 cases of polio in Afghanistan and another 2 cases in Pakistan. We are so close to eradication of polio, but if we were to stop vaccinating the children, there could be 200,000 cases in the world within 10 years. For example, in India there are 1.4 million babies born each month, and with the neighboring countries still harboring polio, the potential for spreading this highly infectious disease is high. It can even happen in America, where a traveler returning from Pakistan contracted polio while visiting a New Jersey neighborhood with low vaccination rates. Vaccination is key to stopping polio.

We can help by joining the PolioPlus Society. Sign-up to donate as little as \$10 per month by going to https://my.rotary.org/en/donate. The Gates Foundation will match your donation 2 to 1, tripling the investment in polio eradication.
