Phase 1 Civic Center Vision Plan was completed in summer 2020, with plans for a renovated park and an Art Hub in the Veteran's Memorial Building and vision-aligned city services in the Maudelle Shirek Building. Eleanor will talk about preliminary plans to seismically retrofit and reactivate these buildings and redesign the park, so that the Civic Center becomes the prime space for civic life, culture, and the arts in the heart of our
