

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Notes from Nice: The Flood of 2020

It rained last Thursday. David (my neighbor) and I got drenched as we walked over to

the neighborhood pool hall for some sociable games with our friend Robert. I don think I had seen such a downpour since we moved here three years ago. Fortunately, the weather had cleared by the time we left for home.

The next day was absolutely gorgeous. Couldn thave been better. David and his wife Cicely invited us for a drive, and so Romy and I set off with them for Ste. Agnes, one of the many hilltop towns that surround Nice. In addition to being one of the most beautiful villages in France, at an altitude of c. 800 meters, it is also the highest hill town in the country, if not in all of Europe. Its buildings date back to the 15th century, and it was also an outpost on the southern Maginot Line which faced Italy.

And how was Ste. Agnes? Don t know; we never made it there. About six kilometers from the village, we ran into a roadblock. A sign said that the road was closed. It had just been placed by an emergency vehicle, and the driver told us that there had been a landslide. So much for Ste. Agnes. Although an alternate route existed via Menton, it was too long.

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
