UC Berkeley Adds New College in Data Science

Anthony Suen's recent presentation to the club was nothing short of awe-inspiring. As the Director of the Data Science Discovery Program at UC Berkeley, his expertise and vision for the future of data science education were on full display. Perhaps one of the most important revelations was Suen's pivotal role in the foundation of the new CDSS (College of Data Science and Society) gateway building at the northern edge of campus on Hearst Street in Berkeley. With over \$500 million in donations

already secured (including a \$252 million gift from an anonymous donor), this will serve as the epicenter for a revolutionary transformation of UC Berkeley's data science landscape.

Berkeley's ascent to the numero uno spot in the nation's Data Science programs is no accident, considering its legendary pedigree, which can be traced back to the inception of the BIDS (Berkeley Institute for Data Science) program in 2013. The UC Regents' approval of the CDSS gateway in 2023 marked a historic moment, as it will house the two largest majors at Berkeley—computer science and data science—and represents the first new college at the university in half a century. The Governor came to town on October 5, bringing a message of collaboration and partnership. Wearing a baseball shirt to represent the team concept, District Governor Claire Roberts first talked about the priorities of Rotary International, under the leadership of President Gordon McInally:

- Promoting peace
- Empowering girls
- Focusing on Diversity, Empowerment, and Inclusion
- Polio Eradication
- Focus on Mental Health

She noted that while we can make a difference as individual Rotarians or clubs, we can do even more when we collaborate with other clubs or forge partnerships within our communities with non-Rotarians and other nonprofit groups. In doing so, we also spread the message and image of Rotary.

Many of these successful grant proposals reflect—once again—partnerships among clubs.

We have the opportunity, throughout the district, to learn from each other and help each other achieve our goals.
