Ghost Ships of San Francisco

Gloria Lenhart is an author and historian who created the smart phone app CITY EXPLORER SAN FRANCISCO, which lets you take self-guided tours of some of the most interesting parts of the city. At our October 13 meeting she discussed ghost ships in San Francisco. Deep under the skyscrapers in the downtown/financial district, at least 40 ghost ships of the Gold Rush lay hidden out of sight. A few of these ships have been uncovered and studied. More are still waiting to be found. How the ships got there is a story unique to San Francisco.

Prior to 1846, the San Francisco Bay reached all the way to where the Transamerica Pyramid stands today. During the Gold Rush, hundreds of



ships were abandoned in the bay as passengers and crew ran off to the gold fields. Dozens of these abandoned ships were tied to wharves extending into the bay, used as warehouses, stores, hotels, and taverns.
