Update: Berkeley Schools Respond to the Pandemic

2020 due to the pandemic. With a banner of Emerging Stronger Together, Superintendent Stephens provided the club with an overview of virtual learning and the reopening of schools in April and May of 2021. He shared what the last two years looked like from the worry of transmission of the virus and the wait for the vaccine to what makes Berkeley a special place as the community pulled together to carry on through the pandemic with financial contributions and volunteer support.

Superintendent Stephens emphasized the impressive level of compassion seen in the Berkeley community. A half million dollars was raised from the community through the Berkeley Public Schools Fund (BPSF) for direct use by families for food support, rent, subsidies for transportation, offsetting loss of jobs, and help to find living arrangements. Working with the city, ten homeless families found temporary hotel accommodations and eventually found permanent residency.

The Latest Video Update - World Polio Day, Oct. 24

October is PolioPlus month in Rotary across the world, and this past Sunday, Oct. 24, was the international World Polio Day. Since the start of PolioPlus, the international effort to eliminate polio has allowed some19 million to escape polio paralysis, and saved the lives of 1.5 million children.

Below is a link to the latest video from Rotary International on the changes in strategy as we get close to eliminating the wild polio virus and shift more to the vaccine-derived virus. Our newsletter scooped the video with its stories over the past months about much of this information, but in the video you'll hear about the new polio vaccine which reduces mutations and significantly prevents vaccine-derived polio; about the work in Pakistan, Afghanistan, and Africa to eliminate polio in those countries; and the linkage of our PolioPlus work to ongoing broader efforts to improve health care, protection against diseases, and fear of vaccination as a health tool. There are lots of thank-you's to Rotary from international health care leaders as well as from those in countries that are the last to reach wild polio elimination. The video is 28 minutes in length, so watch it when you can take the time.


