# Election 2020: Reclaiming Optimism in an Age of Pessimism

Darren Zook, our speaker on October 21, teaches at the University of California, Berkeley in Global Studies and Political Science. For more than 20 years at Cal, he has taught and



published on a wide variety of topics, including: the politics of music, human rights and international law, terrorism and security studies, multiculturalism and diversity, cybersecurity, and economic policy with a focus on anti-corruption programs.

His research interests have continuously grown into an unusually broad portfolio of international and comparative projects, and his work has taken him to various parts of Asia, Latin America, the Pacific Islands, Africa, and northern Europe.

Speaking on Election 2020: Reclaiming Optimism in an Age of Pessimism, Darren started by reminding us how we got here, with the 2016 election, stories about its meaning, and a polarized country. He reminded us of all the things we are concerned about (the bad news). He then claimed that we are in a changed moment (the good news).

In Darren's view, a key issue in all of this is whether we address this hard work from a party-centric perspective or side with what will be good for the country as a whole. For example, making a change to the electoral college would require collaboration of the big and the small states; if it were to happen that way it would be good for all concerned, not just for one party or perspective. Darren backs focusing on the country.

He encouraged us to reclaim optimism by acknowledging that the system is holding up remarkably well, constraints are in place, voters are voting, differences are being bridged, by citizens if not by the politicians, and problems are being faced. We have weathered some difficult stuff remarkably well in terms of civil engagement. Read More
