

# Housing, Homelessness, and Mental Health in Berkeley

Last week, Peter Radu, the Neighborhood Services Manager for the City of Berkeley, gave an informative presentation on homeless encampments in Berkeley. He began by stating he was both a Stanford and a Cal grad, to appreciative applause until he admitted to cheering for Stanford during Big Game (boo!). Despite this, his presentation was engaging, and we ran out of time before we ran out of discussion.



Peter started by identifying three key factors that drive homelessness, the first far and away the primary factor, but the other two exacerbate the problem.

- 1. Cost of housing (especially compared to stagnant minimum wages).
- 2. The federal case *Martin vs City of Boise*, which prohibits a city from criminalizing sitting, sleeping, or lying on public property when there are not sufficient shelter beds.
- 3. Social distancing rules during COVID, which cut the number of available shelter beds in half.

He explained that, contrary to common opinion, drugs and alcohol are not big contributors to the size of the homeless population. He pointed out that some areas of the country have very high drug and alcohol abuse rates but do not have corresponding

homeless rates because of lower-cost housing. He also said that other studies showed that mental illness is also not as big a driver as the simple fact that housing is too expensive.
