I was born in Paris, France to an English mother and a Scottish father. My mother was a playwright and a very interesting and free-spirited lady who traveled extensively, married 3 times, and had 5 children. My father was a fairly well-known English actor.

Berkeley Gardens with Natives in Mind

Last week, Jeanne Wilson, Nursery Chair and Co-Chair of the Redbud Chapter of the California Native Plant Society, told us all about native Berkeley plants and flowers and how to design our gardens with natives in mind. I was very proud and happy to have her join us as she is my sister and herself a native of

Berkeley.

Jeanne described the current state of native plants in our nation with a few grim statistics that only 5% of the land remains native and the drastic impact that has on the land, water, air, and native animal and insect populations. One example is the tiny caterpillars that depend on very specific native plants to eat and lay their eggs on. These caterpillars metamorphize into beautiful California Pipevine Swallowtale butterflies. She also described the important role California plays as home to over 8,000 native plant

species and our own cornucopia of over 800 native species right here in Berkeley. Read More
