Ins and Outs of Our Club Funds

Where do Berkeley Rotary funds come from and where do they go? At the December 1 meeting Grier Graff and Tina Etcheverry (Secretary and Treasurer of the club's Endowment) presented an overview of the source of our funding and the range of projects that the club supports. Details are posted online at the club's website at BerkeleyRotary.org. *Note:* We had technical problems with the audio at this meeting, some of which are captured in the online video, but the slides are very informative.



In general, funding is provided through individual member donations (annual donations and bell-ringing checks), fundraising events (like our online auction and Zentangle sessions this year), matching contributions from our Rotary district and Rotary International, and income from our investments. We also have sustained funding, usually restricted to specific programs.

And where do our dollars go? Every year the club funds scholarships, local and international projects, and direct grants to community organizations. Some expenditures are ongoing and funded through designated gifts, like our support for the Rotacare clinic in Richmond and our college scholarship program. Some grants are made through annual requests by club members on behalf of community organizations or international projects and reviewed by the Grants Committee three times per year, with recommendations submitted to the Endowment Trustees for approval.
