Shaping the Future: A Perspective on BRC Grants

Last Wednesday Tina and Grier gave us a clear overview of our club s finances where the money came from and where it went. I was surprised to find that we do not first raise a pile of money and then decide how to best to spend it. Instead groups within the club raise money for an activity they wish to pursue. That s s how our Designated Gift programs, like the one modernizing schools in Chacala, RotaCares programs for medical and social services for the poor in Richmond, and our scholarships for deserving students are funded.

Designated Gifts like these account for the lions share (\$163,500) of our grant expenditures.



The other source of funds is comprised of Undesignated Gifts donations that do not direct a specific use. Undesignated Gifts totaled about \$60,000 in 2019/2020, but that total will shrink to about \$30,000 in 2020/2021 because of the loss of revenues from the Kite Festival and Golden Gate Fields. As a member of the grants committee I feel that the Undesignated Gifts program is grossly underfunded since it not only provides needed aid to nonprofits in the community, but also informs us about what nonprofits in the area are doing. We learn as we give and later sometimes work with these groups.

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
