Where to Send Those End-of-Year Rotary Donations

It's the end of the tax year when Americans are at their most charitable. Multiple members have called or emailed recently about where to send their Rotary donations. Let me remind you where to send your donations and about the club asks.

Checks for the Club Endowment should be make out to the Berkeley Rotary

Endowment and mailed to Tina Etcheverry, Endowment Treasurer, 1471 Greenway Terrace, Berkeley, 94708. Checks for the Rotary Foundation, whether for the Annual Fund (which funnels grants back to clubs) or for Polio Plus, should be made out to the Rotary Foundation, and mailed to Fred Collignon, Foundation Chair, 2925 Russell St., Berkeley 947705. Note on the check if it's for Polio Plus. Alternatively, you can use our website's DONATE button to send money to the Endowment, or the link near the button on the Rotary International website and do your contribution to the Foundation or Polio Plus through your "My Rotary" account.

What's the club ask? Well, 3-2-1 has been the annual club ask for 15 years: \$300 to the club's Endowment, \$200 to the Rotary International Foundation, and at least one service project a year. The minimum ask for the Foundation is \$25/year, which enables the club to achieve the goal of "Every Rotarian Every Year." That's a good minimum goal for Endowment support too, rather than giving nothing. It makes you part of all that Rotary and the club do. After listening intently to his talk for 30 minutes, members peppered Dr. Swartzberg with questions for another half an hour. Many were specific to their circumstances--Should we socialize with our grandchildren?--and he answered them thoughtfully and honestly. Of particular interest was his suggestion that we make more use of the now more widely available home rapid COVID tests. These antigen tests take just 15 minutes. Their accuracy rate is highest when there are symptoms, but they are useful even if there are none. The Abbotts BinaxNOW brand is well respected and available online from walmart.com.
