# **Program:** Pat Lee, Claremont Kiwanis



Founded in 1915, Kiwanis International is dedicated to serving children around the world. The mission is to improve the world, one child, one community, at a time. The Claremont Kiwanis Club was founded in 1924.



President Buff Wright introduced our speaker, **Pat Lee**, President of the <u>Claremont Kiwanis Club</u>, Pat was joined by Linda Clinton, Presidentelect, and Greg Shapton, Assistant Division Secretary. Pat is an Los Angeles

native, and studied at Cal Poly Pomona. She retired from a career as an administrative judicial secretary at the LA County Superior Court. For 25 of her 34 years in the court system she was assigned to the Pomona Superior Court. Pat and her husband have been married for 54 years, had two daughters, one of whom died in her 20s leaving an infant daughter that Pat and her husband raised. Now in her 30s, their granddaughter is a school psychologist. Her other daughter lives and works in Fontana, for Kaiser, and has two daughters herself, one of them on assignment with Americorps in Iowa. Pat and her husband also raised her younger

brother's son, Daniel, who had cerebral palsy and died two years ago before turning 30. Daniel was a regular at Ability First, which Pat also served 12 years as President of the Foothill Guild, the Ability First fundraising arm. Through Ability First, she got to know some Kiwanians, like Jess Swick, who served as auctioneer at Ability First's fundraising events at Candlelight Pavilion. At one of those events, Kiwanian Woody Douglas offered an in-ground jacuzzi, and Pat was hooked.

Pat observed local Kiwanians who arranged beach outings for special needs children at Danbury School, and was struck by the loving generosity of the Kiwanians who interacted with those children on those excursions. When she retired 15 years ago, they recruited her and she responded to the full-court press by joining Kiwanis. A couple of years in, the president, seeing her talent in engaging and organizing people, approached her about becoming hospitality chair—an assignment she still holds.

Kiwanis is very hands-on. Like Rotary, there are retirees among their number, which actually frees them up for volunteer service. One of their members has faithfully staffed the cashier table at Monday concerts in the park, sitting in his wheelchair. Some of the Kiwanis activities you may have noticed: Sees Candy sales,

### ROTARY, THE ZOOM MEETING

**President Buff** noted that a year ago, we had the first trial balloon of a zoom meeting. This week is the anniversary of the first meetings on Zoom in 2020. We had a Board meeting on the 17<sup>th</sup>. And on the 20<sup>th</sup>, as reported in the March 20, 2000 Clarifier, we sang, we told stories, we whined a little, we had some good



ideas. Twenty-two people attended. Steve Schenck took no pictures but put up a cool photo background. Cameron called the meeting to discuss three questions: Shall we have actual club meetings using this format, with a speaker, that could be recorded and posted later? Should club committees have virtual meetings, to put together a year-end report? What are we doing to help the community, and are there additional things we could do as a club or as individuals? Breakout topic was "Look how far we've come in a year"

And when we came back from breakout, we took a poll again to consider when we will feel comfortable going back to the DoubleTree. 52% willing to meet in June (up from 25% a month ago), 94% interested in a hybrid meeting. Brett O'Connor voiced concern about the hybrid model as we may lose fabric of meeting if many people attend online rather than in person. Don Gould thought it would be a good idea to keep zoom as part of the meeting for those who can't get to the meeting in person. Tim Harrison is donating to the club an "Owl" camera system that may help with a video feed that helps give the feeling of being there for those on zoom.

Barbara Troxell guessed that


Twitter was founded in 1980 —


thought it was "Please Please Me" and controversy over UK

hosting Concerts in the Park, Children's Concerts, the Claremont Farmers' Market, the Read Me program at local schools, the Route 66 Party, July 4<sup>th</sup> concession booth, dozens of grants and scholarships (including 4-year scholarships for College-bound students, and 2-year scholarships for San Antonio High School graduates pursuing a technical track), support for CLASP, and sponsoring a Key Club at the high school. Kiwanis also supports the Food Bank at Joslyn Senior Center, helping recipients carry food to their cars; they serve breakfast to seniors. Like us, they identify families at the holidays and support them through the Adopta-Family program. They host a Valentine's Day party for Seniors, including Bingo! This year's valentine's event included a virtual Family Feud.

The Claremont Kiwanis Club also works with Kiwanis International to eliminate maternal and neonatal tetanus and iodine deficiency disorders around the world.

The club operates food concessions at public events throughout the year—if you've had a burger or a hot dog at a Concert in the Park or a pancake breakfast at the Easter Egg Hunt (aka Spring Gathering) or the Thanksgiving Turkey Trot, or the July 4<sup>th</sup> Freedom 5000, it was Kiwanians cooking and serving.

Of course, this pandemic year has put a damper on many of their usual fundraising activities, as well as their meetings. Normally, they meet Thursdays at noon at St. Ambrose Episcopal Church on Bonita. Now it's every other Thursday on Zoom. They are in the planning stages for fundraisers, including a virtual Bingo night and one or two virtual concerts with Michael Ryan, since the Concerts in the Park and the Route 66 Party are canceled for this year. It's been a challenging year for them, as it has been for us,

and they've been fortunate to have Pat at the helm, as we've been to have Buff at ours.

Despite all the outreach and activity, many Claremonters don't know what Kiwanis is or what it's about –a fate we in Rotary seem to share. Now we have a much better idea!

Kiwanis now meets on zoom every other Thursday at noon. Soon returning to the Social Hall of St. Ambrose Episcopal Church, 830 West Bonita



The Board approved funding for three additional organizations this month. CERT, Priceless Pets and the CHS Choral program.


